Mershon Center begins developing new initiative in peace studies

Students wanting to learn how to set up refugee camps in war-torn regions of the world and faculty looking for the latest research on peace will soon have a new resource at the Mershon Center for International

The center is working with university partners to develop a peace studies initiative consisting of three parts:

Security Studies.

- A minor in peace studies to be offered in coming years through the International Studies program.
- An online certificate program that will combine

courses in the theory and practice of peace building.

An academic conference

on peace studies likely at the Mershon Center in 2012-13. It will be open to the public.

Critical to the initiative is the hiring of two positions. One is an endowed Chair in

Peace Studies, for which the Mershon Center is currently conducting a search.

The other is Peace Studies Coordinator **John Carlarne**, who will be teaching several courses including Introduction to Peace Studies; Activism, Power and Social Change; and a readings seminar.

Carlarne's research focuses on nonviolence, with particular emphasis on the role of civilian actors in fostering change within unraveled and unraveling states. He has worked in 14 countries, including post-conflict Bosnia and Croatia, where he conducted an analysis of peace-building initiatives by the international community.

Carlarne has also been a member of Peace Brigades International since 1996, and is currently a member of the organization's International Council. He has a doctorate in social and cultural anthropology from University of Oxford.

Mershon welcomes new director

J. Craig Jenkins, professor of sociology, political science and environmental science, has joined the Mershon Center for International Security Studies as its new director this year.

Jenkins comes to the center after a year as a visiting

professor at the Peace Research Institute of Oslo, and before that as chair of the Sociology Department.

His research focuses on four major themes:

- Rentier states and political conflict in the Middle East
- patterns of political contention
- the development and impact of the U.S. environmental movement
- the political economy of high technology development. Jenkins has been the recipient of numerous Mershon grants, including:
- Rentierism and Conflict in the Middle East, which also won a grant from the National Science Foundation
- World Handbook of Political Indicators IV
- The Development of Islamist Insurgency: Egypt, 1986-1999

- Rentier States and International Terrorism in Ecological Focus
- Dissent/Repression Nexus in the Middle East, which also won a grant from the National Science Foundation
- If it Bleeds, It Leads: Assessing Media Effects on Transnational Terrorism
 - The Ecology of Terrorist Organizations
- Violent Conflict, Environmental Degradation, and Food Security
- Conflict Carrying Capacity and the Early Warning of Civil Violence

He is author of more than 80 referred articles and book chapters and *The Politics of Insurgency: The Farm Worker Movement of the 1960s* (1986), *The Politics of Protest* (1995), *Identity Conflicts* (2007) and *The Handbook of Politics* (2010).

Jenkins was named a Fulbright Fellow to Norway in 2010, a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2009, and a Joan N Huber Faculty Fellow in 2003.

Among his immediate goals at the Mershon Center are to hire distinguished scholars in the endowed Chair in Peace Studies and Conflict Resolution and Woody Hayes Chair of National Security, as well as continue to build Mershon's program of conferences and events and its research grants to faculty and students.
