Overview

2011 Annual Meeting of the Central Eurasian Studies Society is an event put on by the preeminent scholarly organization for Central Asian studies. CESS is a private, non-political, non-profit, North Americabased interdisciplinary organization of scholars who are interested in the study of Central Eurasia: a region that stretches from the Black Sea region, the Crimea, and the Caucasus in the west, through the Middle Volga region, Central Asia and Afghanistan, and on to Siberia, Mongolia and Tibet in the east.

The CESS conference program reflects the fact that Central Eurasia is a region whose geo-political importance has grown immensely in the post-Cold War, post-9/11 world. The conference will discuss some of the following ideas.

- It holds hydrocarbons that are potentially the world's largest underdeveloped reserve.
- It has undergone rapid post-socialist democratic reforms and economic liberalization.
- It has witnessed a surge of Islamic activity.
