1.1 Buildings were never officially named by Board of Trustees.

1.2 Alternate names noted:

Generally called Engineering Annexes A, B, and c.

H 413 was A; H 414, B; and H 415, C.

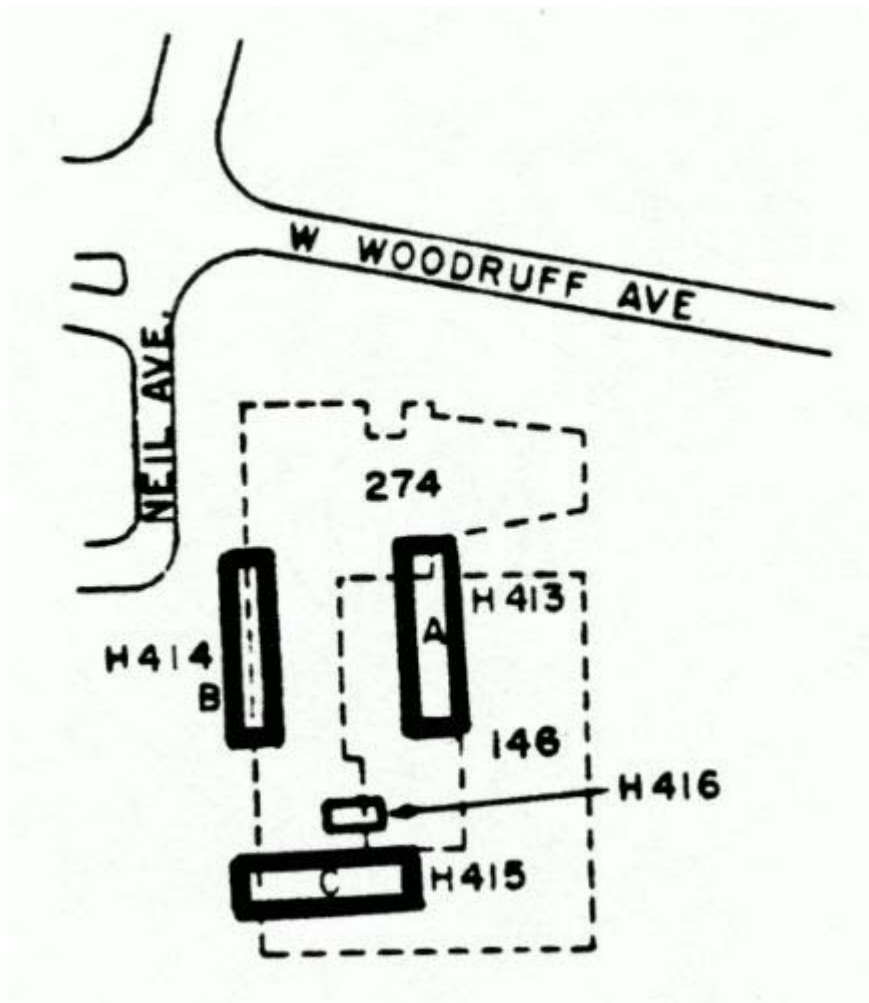
2. Location

3. General Description

3.1 Type of construction:

Frame

3.2 No. of stories:

Two

3.3 Increments of construction:

No additions

3.4 Area of buildings:

Each of the three buildings was 25' x 117', with an area of 5850 sq. ft.

B. PLANNING & CONSTRUCTION

1. These were Buildings T 106, T 107, and T 108 brought from Wright Field and re-erected on campus following

World War II.

2. Beginning of work:

A photograph in the Monthly (38:5—April 1947) shows these building under construction.

3. Completion and occupancy:

3.1 H 413 was accepted by the University Architect on August 27, 1947; the other two on September 5, 1947 (A).

3.2 The Lantern reported on October 13, 1947 that the buildings were in use.

C. DEMOLITION

1. The Board of Trustees on December 10, 1951 voted to demolish all three buildings during 1952-53.

However,
this was not done.
