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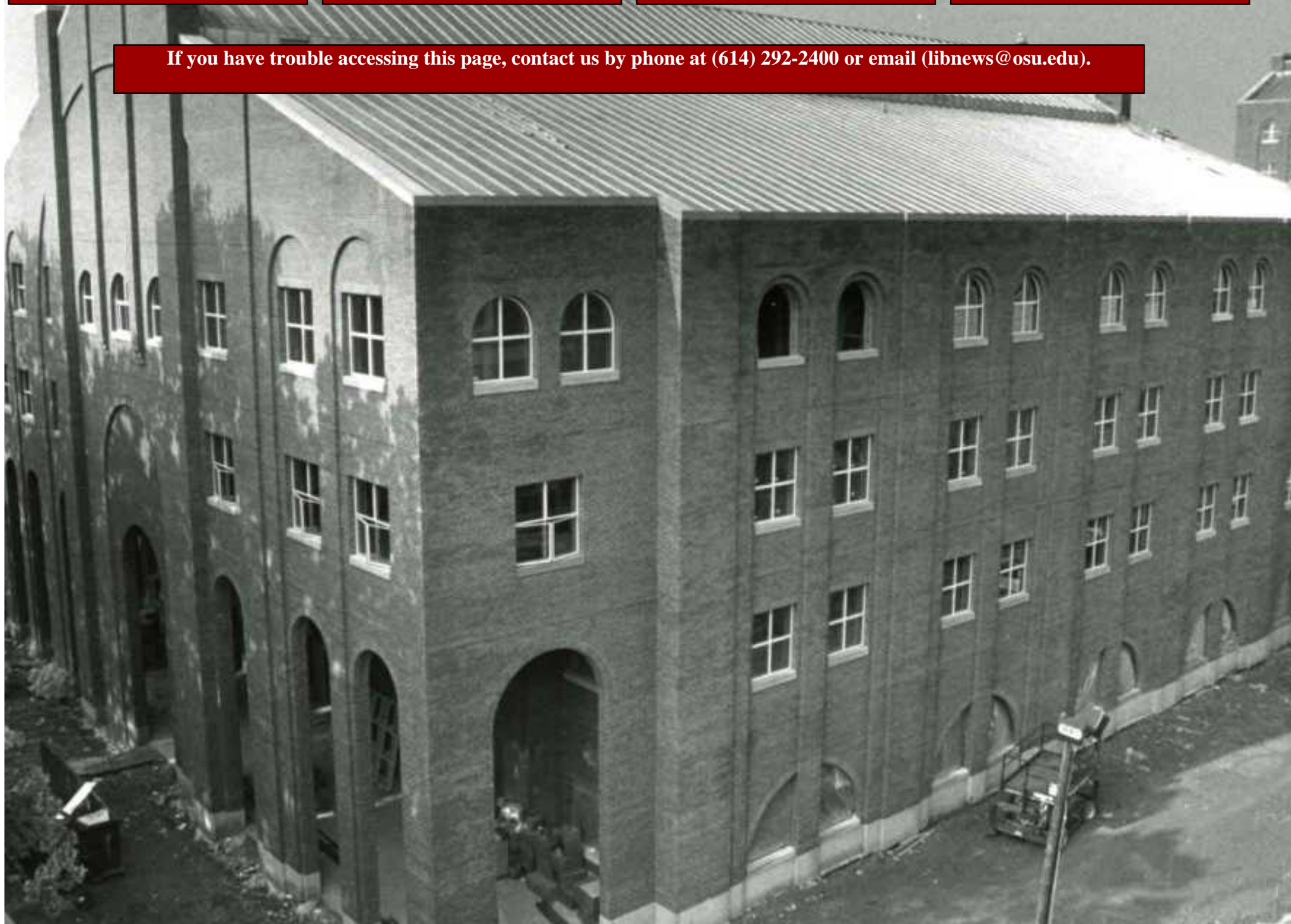

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John Glenn Audiovisual Collection Open to Public Research



The John Glenn Archives announces the opening to public research of the Audiovisual Collection of former United States Senator and noted astronaut, John Glenn. The collection contains approximately one hundred cubic feet of materials and nearly three hundred oversized, framed items documenting all aspects of Senator Glenn's life as well as the life of his wife, Anna "Annie" Castor Glenn. Items within the collection date from 1896 to 2003, though the bulk of the materials date from 1959 to 1998. Included are materials from John Glenn's childhood in New Concord, Ohio, from Glenn's military, space, corporate, and post-senate careers, and from Glenn's four terms (1975-1999) as a United States



Senator from Ohio.

Approximately one-third of the Audiovisual Collection consists of photographs ranging from family snapshots to photographs taken by official photographers for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the United States Senate. Other visual materials in the collection include original works of art, limited edition prints, cartoons, portraits, maps, and motion pictures in both film and video format. The collection contains an extensive amount of sound recordings consisting of cassette and reel-to-reel tapes, phonographic recordings, and compact disks. Also contained within the collection are numerous certificates and awards given to John Glenn, along with various types of ephemera collected by Senator Glenn over the course of his fifty years in public service.

The John Glenn Archives web site, located at www.lib.ohio-state.edu/arvweb/glenn/glenn.htm, contains a finding aid with detailed information about the scope and content of the Audiovisual Collection. Through this online guide researchers may choose to search the collection inventory by key word or browse through the collection folder headings. Also available on the web site are similar finding aids for the Senate Papers and the Non-Senate Papers portions of the John Glenn Archives. Housed within the Ohio State University Archives Building at 2700 Kenny Road, Columbus, Ohio 43210, the John Glenn Archives is open to researchers Monday through Friday from 9 to 12am and from 1 to 4:30pm. Profile of Need

Hunger exists right here in our own backyard - in Columbus and throughout Ohio. Since the beginning of 2000, the Mid-Ohio FoodBank has seen a 29 percent increase in the number of people turning to food pantries for help.

In January, 60 Minutes II reported on the issue of hunger in the United States. They focused on the growing need for food assistance in Marietta and McArthur, Ohio and spoke to many clients waiting in line for food. The rising need and issues faced by those who need help is the same in the 20 counties we serve.

It can be invisible.



Children and Families

Like so many of the working poor, Fran and her two little girls' hunger is invisible. She's not receiving public assistance and they're not living in a shelter. Fran works fulltime for a security company. She enrolls her children in school and daycare. She searches for an affordable rental unit close to her mother so she can help with the children. Fran is working hard and playing by all our rules. Yet there are nights when her children go to bed hungry. For Fran, hungry and worried about what her children will eat tonight, each passing moment is an eternity.

- Children who don't have enough to eat wind up with a diminished capacity to understand and learn. No child can focus on school or other activities on an empty stomach
- Hunger has a serious impact on children's health. Undernourished children are more susceptible to illness, are listless, fatigued, and have little energy for learning, play or sports.
- Whenever the future of a child is stolen by hunger, our future as a community is less bright. Children lose out on their education, and their communities lose out on their educational investments.

It's never expected.

The Working Poor

Many middle-aged workers who started out with high hopes, working at steady manufacturing jobs with good wages, benefits and sometimes overtime, are now laboring in our new "service economy" at much lower wages with no health care benefits. These loyal workers have had to adjust; they've downsized their lifestyle and now struggle to pay their bills.

- Wages haven't kept up with inflation for low-income workers.
- There are more non-permanent, non-full time positions and many workers hold multiple jobs. With the current recession, many of these struggling workers will face lay-offs or cut-backs in the hours they work.

It's always cruel.

Seniors

Seniors who grew up during the Depression certainly know how to stretch a dollar. Yet despite their frugal life style, their expenses have outgrown their income. Those who helped build this great country often face the cruel choice of filling their prescriptions or filling their refrigerators.

- Ever increasing bills for housing, utilities, and medications mean little is left for food.
- Inadequate nutrition intensifies chronic diseases and speeds the onset of degenerative diseases.

It spans circumstances and generations and crosses cultures.

Soup Kitchen Lines

A soup line has always been the salvation for someone down on their luck, or suffering from a chronic addiction or a mental illness. But there are new faces in today's soup kitchen lines.

- The fifteen-year old who ran away to escape angry fists only to face the pain of hunger.
- The veteran who never made the transition back.
- The family that shows up when school's out and there's no free school lunch for the children.
- An elderly widow who finds her pension won't stretch to the end of the month.

Today's complex world is a frightening place for many. A soup kitchen can provide a filling meal, companionship and a kind word for very vulnerable people.

Hunger Report

Hunger in America

Americans are increasingly relying on food pantry services. Second Harvest estimates that 26 million people rely on emergency services to obtain food. Of these 26 million people, 75% have income under \$10,000, only 35% are employed, and 60% have been on food stamps for one year or more. Reliance on food stamps is growing: there were 20 million food stamp recipients in 1990 and 26 million in 1996. Most people relying on food stamps are children.

Position of the American Dietetic Association

Chronic hunger due to poverty is more widespread than acute hunger due to famine. Of preschool-aged children in developing countries, 36% are moderately or severely malnourished (based on weight for

age). Since 1985, hunger in the US has increased because of under funding by the US government.

Nutrition and Cognitive Development in Children

Moderate undernutrition is the type most commonly seen in the United States, poverty being the primary factor leading to undernutrition in children. Though termed moderate, undernutrition has long-lasting effects on the cognitive development of children including the possibility of leading to educational failure.

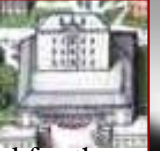

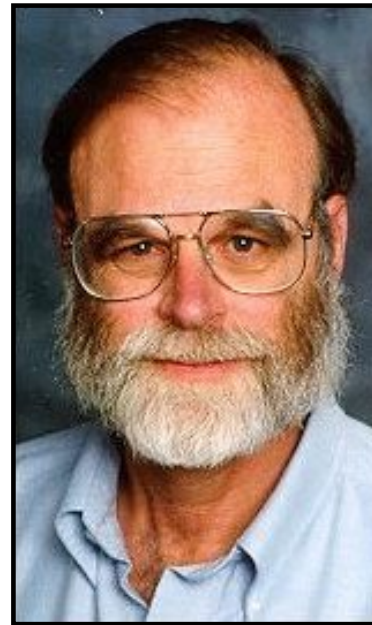

I am pleased to announce changes in the Administrative Services Department. She will supervise Mail Services and OhioLINK, Library security, and workpool. Toni will continue her responsibilities as Libraries' Personnel Officer. Mark Moziejko and Duke Morgan will now report to Toni. Mark is responsible for supervising the Mail Services and OhioLINK operations as well as supervising security weekends. Pam Bivens and Mary Parnell will report to Mark. Duke is responsible for supervising Main Library and SEL security, implementing security at EHS and other libraries as well as serving as an important liaison with the second shift custodians. Charles Smith will supervise the workpool students.

As with any change there is a learning curve, although the learning for Toni started several weeks ago. From this point forward, anything you once asked Ryan to handle, you will request from Toni. She is equipped with the same tools and contacts that Ryan used.

We are very excited about these changes and are fortunate to have a talented staff that can, and is willing to, take on new, varied, and sometimes abstract responsibilities.

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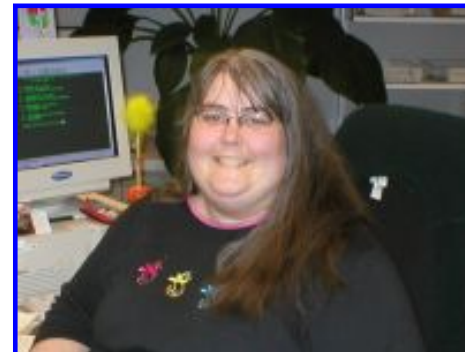

Spot Bonus Awards for Depository Staff

Jennifer Henman, David Morneau and Joshua Young were rewarded spot bonuses for their work in creating item records for over 7,300 Main Library serial volumes during the months of February and March 2004. David and Joshua were primarily responsible for locating serial sets in the bookstacks that had summary records on FELIX, and without any laptop or other computer workstation available, manually wrote down the complete volume information off of each piece, barcoded the item, and then recorded the barcode numbers next to the volume information.

Using the information that David and Joshua manually recorded, Jennifer was responsible for creating item records on FELIX for these serial volumes and then keying the barcode numbers into the records. While creating these 7,000+ records and adding the barcode numbers to the system, Jennifer also corrected other problems she observed while working on these particular titles.

Because of their willingness to take on this additional workload, each of these staff members made a substantial contribution to the Library by helping to prepare the Main stacks collection for the renovation project.
