Computational Humanities - bridging the gap between Computer Science and Digital Humanities: *A report on the Dagstuhl seminar*

This summer's Dagstuhl Seminar on Computational Humanities sought to boost the rapidly emerging interdisciplinary field of Computational Humanities by bringing together leading researchers in the (digital) humanities and computational analysis. We will report on our participation in the seminar, its projects and participants, and their own work both in the Dagstuhl working group on Lexicon and Literature and on the OSU Herodotos Project for Ancient Ethnohistory.

September 18: Hands-on with the HathiTrust Research Center

The [HathiTrust Research Center](#) (HTRC) exists to facilitate scholarly work with the large corpus of digitized materials in the HathiTrust repository. Their goal is to "to help meet the technical challenges of dealing with massive amounts of digital text that researchers face by developing cutting-edge software tools and cyber infrastructure." Three representatives from HTRC will visit OSU on Thursday, September 18, to share with us the work the center is doing, and to gather input from the community. As a member institution of the Hathi Trust, and an active contributor through our Google book scanning partnership, this is our chance to learn how to take advantage of the resources available to us through the Research Center. The day will consist of three separate sessions: a public lecture, a hands-on workshop, and a community discussion session. All sessions are open to interested members of the OSU community.

 - Audience: The first hour will cover the HTRC portal, and is appropriate for the general public. Those with some programming background may want to stay for the second hour, which will cover the HTRC data API. *Space is limited for this session, so please RSVP to Ruth Sesco ([Sesco.3](#)) and indicate if you plan to attend only the first hour, or the entire workshop.*

On September 18, following the HathiTrust Open Session, the Engaged Librarian Forum will focus on Data Management Services and Library Data Requests.

Is data...boring? Not at University Libraries! Come see what data services are already being offered by the libraries and learn about new resources. During this ELF meeting you will have the opportunity to review and discuss case studies based on real-life situations from the OSU Libraries.

Amanda Rinehart will provide an overview of a new suite of services focusing on Data Management. This covers the range of data ethics, rules of thumb for file naming, and best practices for new and emerging grant requirements. Come and learn what questions to refer to her as well as get a flavor of her typical interactions and how you can partner with her to support your constituents' data management needs.

The second half of the forum will be a discussion about data requests that the library currently gets. **Juleah Swanson** will facilitate the discussion about data needs around campus and will provide examples of ingenious faculty and graduate students who are unaware of our vendor agreements and bulk download articles. If you have other examples of the kind of data that your users have requested, we'd love to hear about that as well.

Special Faculty Assignment Applications being taken

The Committee on Faculty Benefits, Responsibility and Research (CFBRR) invites any interested regular faculty member to apply for Special Assignments (SA). SA releases a regular tenure track faculty member from some regular duties for a period of up to one full term so that he or she may concentrate on a unique research, service or other endeavor related to librarianship or may invest in a relatively brief professional development opportunity.

Applications for SA that will begin in Spring/Summer 2015 are due by September 15, 2014. All regular tenure track faculty are eligible to apply for an SA; priority is given to untenured faculty members. There are many options for length, timing, scale of project and so forth. Interested faculty are encouraged to consult with their supervisor and to contact a member of CFBRR with questions (<http://go.osu.edu/cfbrr>).

“The Long March: Civil Rights in Cartoons and Comics,” presents the story of the Civil rights movement through original editorial cartoons, comic strips and comic books. The exhibit explores the struggles and victories from multiple perspectives, including mainstream daily newspapers from the North and South, and the Black press. Artwork from Congressman John Lewis’ bestselling graphic memoir “March” and his experiences as a civil rights leader will also be featured.



Will Eisner: 75 Years of Graphic Storytelling

August 16-November 30, 2014

Billy Ireland Cartoon Library & Museum



It is nearly impossible to discuss the history of American comics without mentioning the name Will Eisner. On August 16, the Billy Ireland Cartoon Library & Museum will open a new exhibit, “Will Eisner: 75 Years of Graphic Storytelling,” highlighting works from the library’s holdings. The show will feature

original art from some of Eisner’s greatest works including *The Spirit*, *Contract with God*, *Dropsie Avenue*, *Last Day in Vietnam*, and *The Plot*, as well as rarely-seen selections from his student days, his early work as a commercial artist, and his comics for the military. As a key figure in the birth of the comics industry in the 1930s and the rise of the graphic novel in the 1980s, Eisner influenced—directly and indirectly—everyone involved with graphic storytelling, as an artist, an editor, an entrepreneur and an educator. This exhibit explores the range of Eisner’s work spanning nearly eight decades and documents his impact on the development of comics over the past century.
