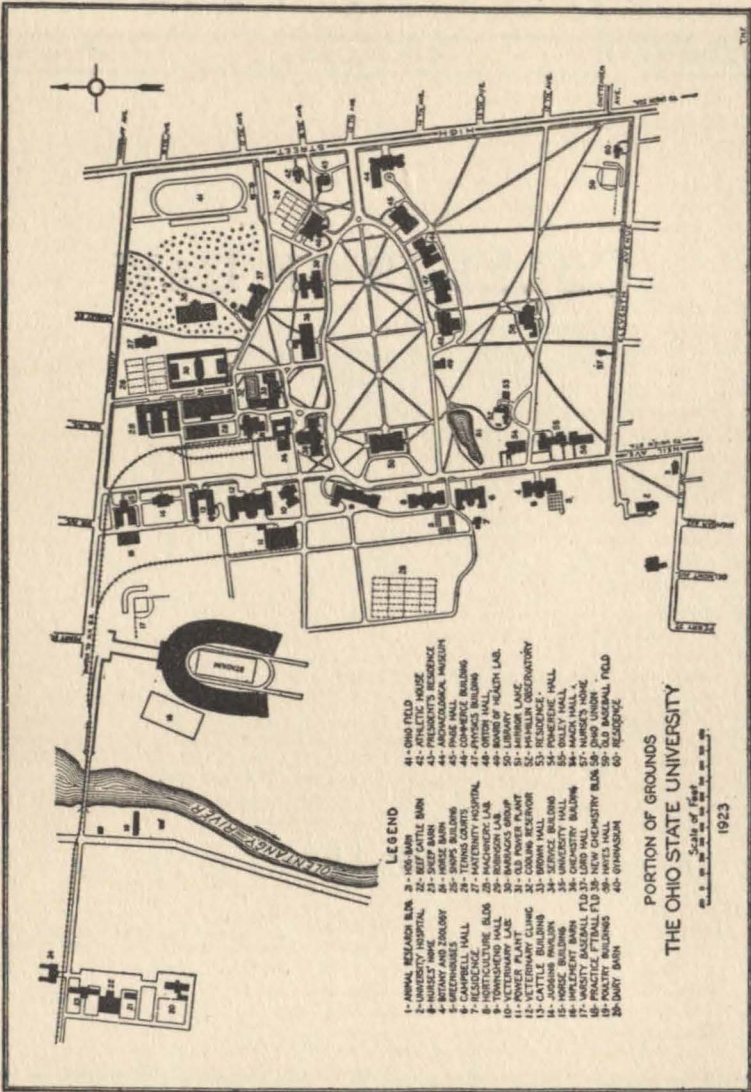

# THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

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The Ohio State University is supported by appropriations from the State and Federal governments. It is the largest university in Ohio. It ranks eighth in size in the United States, and fifth among the state universities.

The Campus and farm cover 880 acres. The Campus proper contains 115 acres. There are 62 buildings on the University grounds, 45 of which are devoted to instruction. The total value of land, buildings, and equipment is \$8,124,062.33. The enrollment in the University, November 1, 1922, was 8843, and the number of instructors and administrative officers 673.

## LOCATION

The University is situated within the corporate limits of the city of Columbus, and is reached by means of the High Street or Neil Avenue electric cars.

The offices of the President of the University, the Entrance Board, the Registrar, and the Bursar are located in University Hall.

## ORGANIZATION

For convenience of administration the departments of the University are grouped into organizations called colleges. The Ohio State University comprises ten colleges and a graduate school, each under the administration of a dean and college faculty, as follows:

This bulletin is devoted exclusively to the work of the College of Law for the academic year, 1923-1924.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

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### AIMS AND EQUIPMENT

The purpose of the College of Law is to impart an accurate knowledge of the principles of the law, to illustrate the application of these principles to the practical affairs of life and to furnish such legal training as will fit students for practice in any part of the country; to teach students both to know and to apply the law.

The College occupies a building upon the Campus, which was completed in 1902, and is named Page Hall for Henry Folsom Page, who was an attorney-at-law and lived at Circleville, Ohio. He bequeathed a large estate valued at nearly a quarter of a million dollars to the Ohio State University.

On the first floor are the offices of the Dean and four large lecture rooms. On the second floor of the building, the Law Library is shelved in a fireproof stack room capable of housing fifty thousand volumes. A large reading room is provided for the accommodation of the students. There is also a consulting room for the accommodation of students.

### LIBRARIES

The Library of the College of Law contains the reports of the Federal Courts, the reports of all the States and Territories, including also the Philippines, Hawaii, Porto Rico, and Alaska, a complete set of the English Reports (as well as the reprints), Canadian Reports, Australian Commonwealth Reports, the National Reporter System, American Reports, American Decisions, American State Reports, Lawyers' Reports Annotated, American and English Annotated Cases, American Bankruptcy Reports, Interstate Commerce Reports, the Statutes and Digests of all the States, and of Canada and England, the standard Legal Encyclopedias and General Digest, standard Legal Periodicals, and about one thousand well selected treatises. The Noble Law Library and the Emerson McMillin Library are included in the above enumeration. At present the Library contains 22,000 volumes, and additions are being made annually.



## ADMISSION

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Applicants for admission must be at least eighteen years of age.

### METHOD OF ADMISSION

The admission of students is in charge of the University Entrance Board, which determines the credits that shall be issued on all entrance examinations and certificates, and furnishes all desired information to applicants. Correspondence relating to admission should be addressed to the University Examiner, The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio.\*

### REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

#### CANDIDATES FOR A DEGREE

Graduates of the Ohio State University, or of other approved universities or colleges, will be admitted upon their records and registered in the College of Law as candidates for the degree, Bachelor of Laws.

Other applicants for admission who are graduates of a high school of the first grade, or who have met the entrance requirements, fifteen units, by examination and have ninety Quarter-credit hours (sixty semester hours), having completed two full years at a college or university of recognized standing in accordance with the rules of that institution, will be admitted to the College of Law as candidates for the degree, Bachelor of Laws.

Students may, at the discretion of the Executive Committee of the College of Law, be admitted on condition. Such conditions shall in no case be in excess of six Quarter-credit hours and must in all cases be removed before the beginning of the student's third year of law.

#### SPECIAL STUDENTS

Persons twenty-one years of age or over who are unable to meet the requirements for admission as regular students, may be admitted as special students not candidates for a degree, upon presenting evidence of their ability to pursue with profit the study of law. Such candidates are admitted by a vote of the Executive Committee of the College of Law and are held to the same degree of thoroughness in their work as are the regular students.

The student desiring to enter as a special student should submit in writing to the Dean during the summer preceding his entrance, a statement of his qualifications and experience, as the entrance of such students is not encouraged and will only be allowed when clear evidence is given of ability to pursue the work.

### ADMISSION WITH ADVANCED STANDING

(a) Applicants for admission with advanced standing must first satisfy the foregoing entrance requirements in the methods described above. This should be done through the Entrance Board.

(b) By presentation of satisfactory certificates issued by a college of law of approved standing, having a course of not less than three years and requiring not less than two years of college work for entrance, such applicants may obtain advanced credits in law to which they are entitled. Applicants for admission to the second year must present satisfactory evidence of having completed the work of the first year of the course in Law or its equivalent. An applicant for admission to the third year must present satisfactory evidence of having completed the work of the first and second years of the course in Law or its equivalent. All law credits must be submitted to the Secretary of the College of Law for adjustment.

In order to obtain the full benefit of the arrangement and detail of the course of study, a student should enter at the beginning of the first year and attend regularly until the completion of the third year.

Those who are unable to do this are earnestly requested to enter promptly at the beginning of the Autumn Quarter.

### THE ARTS-LAW CURRICULUM

Students desiring the degree of Bachelor of Arts in the College of Arts, Philosophy, and Science and the degree of Bachelor of Laws in the College of Law may, by complying with the regulations below, obtain the two degrees in six years.

This course includes the first three years of the curriculum of the College of Arts, Philosophy, and Science, and the three-year curriculum of the College of Law.

**Admission to the College of Arts, Philosophy, and Science.** For admission to the College of Arts, the applicant must present to the Entrance Board a certificate of graduation from a high school of the first grade, or from a preparatory school of approved standing, or he must pass by examination upon 15 units of college entrance subjects. (For details consult the Bulletin of General Information.)

**Residence in the College of Arts, Philosophy, and Science.** In arranging his course the candidate must meet all the requirements of the curriculum of the College of Arts (see announcements for the Arts College) except as modified by the following statement:

A total of 150 Quarter-credit hours is required, including the requirements in military science, physical education, and hygiene. Of these, at least 45 Quarter-credit hours must be in one group (preferably the Social Science Group) and 25 Quarter-credit hours in some other one group (usually Language). In no one of the groups may more than 60 Quarter-credit hours be credited for the degree, not counting those that

are necessary to meet the group requirements. At least 65 Quarter-credit hours of the College of Arts work must be in courses not open to Freshmen.

Business Law (Business Organization 621, 623) may not be counted toward the degree in the combined course.

**Admission to the College of Law.** Upon completion of the requirements of the three years' work in the College of Arts, the candidate registers in the College of Law, at the same time retaining his registration in the College of Arts. To secure this double registration application should be made to the Secretary of the College of Arts.

**Requirements in Hours and Points.** To be eligible for the degree of Bachelor of Arts the candidate must have acquired 150 points and 150 Quarter-credit hours in courses in the College of Arts, including the requirements in military science, physical education, and hygiene; and 40 points and 40 Quarter-credit hours in the College of Law, making a total of 190 points and 190 Quarter-credit hours.

Any deficiency in points upon the completion of the first year in Law must be made up by taking additional courses in the College of Arts. If additional hours are thus taken, the total points so earned must amount to at least 95 per cent of the additional hours undertaken.

**Degrees.** Upon completing the requirements described above (normally in four years) the candidate will be recommended for the degree of Bachelor of Arts; and upon completion of the requirements of the curriculum of the College of Law he will be recommended for the degree of Bachelor of Laws.

The question of the applicant's eligibility to the combined course will be determined by the Executive Committee of the Arts College.

No credit in the College of Arts, Philosophy, and Science will be given for work done in the College of Law except as above provided, but regular fourth year students in the former college may, by special permission, take a limited amount of the work in the College of Law without credit in the College of Arts, Philosophy, and Science.

The work of all students taking studies in the two colleges at the same time is under the jurisdiction of a joint committee, consisting of the Dean and Secretary of the College of Arts, Philosophy, and Science, and the Dean and Secretary of the College of Law.

## REGISTRATION

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**REGISTRATION DAYS.**—One or two days at the opening of the Autumn Quarter preceding the beginning of classroom work are reserved for registration and the payment of fees. Under the Quarter plan each student will present his study-program for only one Quarter. Students who are in residence at the University will be required to present their study-programs for the following Quarter at dates announced during the Quarter.

**TIME OF REGISTRATION.**—All undergraduate students are expected to register on or before the days designated as registration days and to report for work on the day designated as the day for classes to begin. Applicants presenting themselves after the opening of the Quarter can be admitted only for exceptional reasons and by action of the Executive Committee. A student who succeeds in entering after the close of the first week of a Quarter shall, in general, be given a schedule diminished by one full course below the normal for that student.

### HOW TO REGISTER

**NEW STUDENTS.**—Registration consists of the following steps in the order indicated:

1. The student should secure

(a) An admission card from the University Examiner. (For necessary entrance credentials see Requirements for Admission, page 7.)

(b) An election-card or study-program card from the Registrar's Office. This card must be approved by the Secretary of the College of Law.

(c) A fee-card from the Registrar's Office. On this card the student will be assessed with all incidental and tuition fees. The fee-card must be presented to the Bursar when the student pays his fees. All fees must be paid before the student will be admitted to classes.

2. Every entering student must report for a physical examination upon the dates appointed. (See University Calendar, page 1.)

Men should report to the Director of Physical Education for Men, at the University Gymnasium.

Women should report to the Director of Physical Education for Women, at Pomerene Hall.

3. Every entering student must report to the Department of Psychology for an intelligence test, upon the dates appointed. (See University Calendar, page 1.)



4. Every woman student must register with the Dean of Women at her office in Pomerene Hall within twenty-four hours following her registration in the University.

Unless the student has followed the above instructions in every detail his matriculation in the University is not complete.

**STUDENTS IN CONTINUOUS RESIDENCE.**—Students who have been in continuous residence in the University will proceed as follows: They must secure

1. An election-card or study-program card, which must be approved by the Secretary of the College of Law. This card must be obtained at the Registrar's Office.

2. A fee-card, on which will be assessed all incidental and tuition fees. This card must be presented to the Bursar and all fees paid before the student will be admitted to classes. This card must be obtained from the Registrar's Office.

**FORMER STUDENTS.**—A former student who has not been in continuous residence during the preceding year or was not in residence during the preceding Quarter should go at once to the Dean or Secretary for approval of his re-admission. He then follows the same procedure as a student in continuous residence.

**STUDENTS TRANSFERRING TO ANOTHER COLLEGE IN THE UNIVERSITY.**—A student who desires to transfer from this College to another college of this University must make his application for such transfer to the University Examiner. This transfer must be approved by the University Examiner before he will be permitted to proceed with his registration in the college which he is proposing to enter.

### THE MARKING SYSTEM AND POINT SYSTEM

The grade marks given in the several colleges of the University are: A—Excellent or superior; B—Good; C—Average; D—Poor but passing; E—Failure (no credit). A value in "Points" is assigned to each of these grades as follows:

For each credit hour of "A" grade, 4 credit points shall be allowed

For each credit hour of "B" grade, 3 credit points shall be allowed

For each credit hour of "C" grade, 2 credit points shall be allowed

For each credit hour of "D" grade, 1 credit point shall be allowed

The grade of "E" shall receive no credit either in hours or points

The number of credit points required for graduation shall amount to not less than 1.8 times the number of credit hours taken.

### STUDENTS ON PROBATION

Any student who fails during any Quarter to earn credit points equal to at least the number of credit hours taken, shall be put on probation for the succeeding Quarter of his residence at the University with re-

stricted work, to be determined by the Executive Committee of the College of Law. The executive committee of a college may put a student on probation at any time.

#### STUDENTS DROPPED FROM THE UNIVERSITY

During the period of probation, a student who fails to earn credit points at least equal in number to the credit hours taken, shall automatically cease to be a member of the University and shall be so notified by the Dean of the College. A notice shall also be sent to the parent or guardian of the student.

If, for any cause, the preparation, progress, or success of any student in the work assigned him be found unsatisfactory, the President may remove him from a class or dismiss him from the University.

Any student who, having been in residence in the College of Law during six Quarters, shall not have earned credit points equal to at least 1.8 times the number of credit hours taken, shall automatically cease to be a member of the University.

#### ABSENCES BEFORE OR AFTER A MID-QUARTER VACATION

A student absent without excuse from a scheduled hour of work on a day immediately preceding or following a mid-quarter vacation shall have a penalty of three hours negative credit entered upon his record card. It shall be the duty of each instructor to report within five days all absences on such days to the Dean of the College. The authority for excusing students shall be the Dean. He may excuse a student for legitimate absence, and shall certify to the Registrar the penalty imposed upon unexcused students.

#### WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY

If a student finds it necessary to withdraw from the University before the examination at the end of the Quarter, he must secure a withdrawal slip from the Dean. If he fails to do this he will be marked as having failed in all of his courses for the Quarter and this will make it difficult for him to re-enter this University or gain access to any other one. If a personal interview is impossible, the Dean should be notified by mail.

# FEES AND EXPENSES

## GENERAL CHARGES

All University fees must be paid at the opening of each Quarter as a condition of admission to classes. All registration fees are assessed in the office of the Registrar and are paid in the office of the Bursar. Registration is not complete until all fees have been paid. No student will have any privileges in the classes or laboratories until all fees and deposits are paid.

Since all fees are due and payable as a part of the student's registration, no person should come to the University for registration without money sufficient to cover all of his fees and deposits.

**Matriculation Fee.** Every student upon his first admission to the University is required to pay a matriculation fee of \$10.00. This fee is paid but once, and is in addition to other University fees, and entitles the student to the privileges of membership in the University.

**Non-Resident Fee.** Every undergraduate student who is not a legal resident of the State of Ohio is required to pay a non-resident fee of \$35.00 each Quarter of his residence in the University in addition to other University fees. The burden of registering under proper residence is placed upon the student. If there is any possible question of his right to legal residence the matter should be brought to the attention of the Registrar and passed upon, previous to registration or the payment of fees. Any student who registers improperly under this rule shall be required to pay not only the non-resident fee, but shall be assessed a penalty of \$10.00. Students who do not pay this fee within thirty days after they have been notified that the non-resident fee has been assessed against them, will have their registration in the University cancelled.

No person shall be considered eligible to register in the University as a resident of the State of Ohio unless he has been a bona fide resident in the State twelve consecutive months next preceding the date of his original enrollment, and no person shall be considered to have gained or lost a residence in this State for the purpose of registering in the University, by any conduct of his own, while he is a student in the University; but persons whose legal residence follows that of other persons, as hereinafter provided, shall be considered to have gained or lost legal residence in this State for such purpose while students in the University according to changes of legal residence of such other persons, except that such legal residence shall not be considered to be so gained until twelve months after such other person becomes a legal resident of this State.

The residence of minors shall follow that of the legal guardian, regardless of emancipation; but in case a resident of Ohio is appointed guardian of a non-resident minor, the legal residence of such minor for the purpose of this rule shall not be considered to be established in the State of Ohio until the expiration of twelve months after such appointment.

The residence of wives shall follow that of husbands.



Aliens who have taken out first citizenship papers and who have been residents of Ohio for twelve months next preceding the date of their enrollment in the University, shall be regarded as eligible for registration as residents of Ohio.

**Registration Fee.** The fee for all students is \$20.00 each Quarter.

**Penalty for Late Registration.** All fees are due and payable by the close of the day preceding the first day of recitations. In the case of a graduate student, or a student granted late registration, fees must be paid within twenty-four hours of the date of registration as certified by the Dean or Secretary. Failure to comply with this rule involves a penalty of \$5.00 for every succeeding day or fraction thereof.

**The Ohio Union and the Women's Union.** A fee of \$1.00 each Quarter is paid by all students at registration. This entitles the student to all privileges of the Unions, consistent with the Constitutions and House Rules governing them.

**Graduation Fee.** A fee of \$5.00 to cover expenses of graduation and diploma is required of each person receiving one of the bachelor degrees from the University, and this fee must be paid on or before the last Wednesday preceding Commencement.

**Return of Fees.** Fees are not returnable except in case of sickness and causes entirely beyond the control of the student. No portion of the fees shall be returned for voluntary withdrawal of the student or enforced withdrawal thirty days after registration. Students withdrawing under discipline forfeit all right to the return of any portion of the fees. In no case shall more than one-half the fee be refunded.

**Textbooks.** Students should not purchase textbooks until they are advised by the instructors of their respective classes.

#### COST OF A YEAR'S WORK

One of the most perplexing questions that confronts a prospective student is what the course is going to cost him a year.

In order to furnish information we have listed below payments required by the University for the Freshman year and have estimated the cost for room and boarding at a safe price. These two items are sometimes reduced slightly where two students occupy the same room and where boarding clubs are economically managed. Fees to the University are paid at the beginning of each Quarter.

The work of the first year is all required. The work of the second and third years is all elective. Third year students may also elect from second year subjects not already taken. Second and third year students must elect not less than twelve or more than fourteen hours each Quarter, but the Executive Committee may in exceptional cases grant a larger number of hours.

## IMPORTANT NOTICE

Beginning with the Quarter ending June, 1924, the number of Quarter-hours in the College of Law required for the degree of LL.B. or J.D. shall be one hundred and twenty.

## DEGREES

Upon the satisfactory completion of the curriculum as outlined above, including the last year in residence in the College of Law of this University, students will be recommended for the degree, Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.).

The degree of Juris Doctor (J.D.) will be conferred on all who, having the degree of Bachelor of Arts or an equivalent degree from an approved college or university, have completed the course in Law with merit in at least fifty-seven Quarter-credit hours, thirty-eight semester hours, and have been in attendance at this College of Law during the entire last two years of the course, and have taken at least seventy-two Quarter-credit hours in such last two years.
