Yea, Dads! — Welcome, Iowa! Hello, Alumni!

THE game today is more than a simple meeting of Ohio State and Iowa on the Stadium gridiron; it is a real occasion.

It is not only the fifth game between Ohio and Iowa in as many years, but it inaugurates the home team's 1926 Western Conference campaign; it marks the celebration of the annual "Dads' Day;" it is also set aside for Ohio State's observance of "Walter Camp Day," and among the thousands in attendance are several hundred alumni leaders who met this morning for their biennial conference with President Rightmire and other University heads.

Ohio State is particularly glad to welcome Iowa back. It knows Iowa to be a fine foe. It hopes that the relationship will be continued. The present invasion of the Stadium by Iowa is the fourth in the space of five years, and on each occasion the visitors have made a fine impression.

"Dad," individually and collectively, knows he is welcome. The air of the entire campus breathes that spirit today, and not today only, but every day. We wish "Dad" and Mother and the girls, too, could visit us oftener. They keep us in touch with home and we should like to feel that their occasional trips to the campus, particularly on such occasions as this, help to keep them as young as we are.

What is true of the home folks is also true of the alumni, for they are, in a very real sense, the University's own kith and kin. The campus is theirs, of course, as it always has been. We recognize them as older brothers and voice the wish that they, too, might come oftener and stay longer. For the University likes to keep in touch with those who have passed beyond its portals, and it is well worth their while to maintain that relationship, mellowed and hallowed by the years.

Walter Camp, His Day

OHIO STATE always associates Walter Camp with one of its golden football days. He paid the campus but one visit, but that, fortunately, came on that dramatic Saturday afternoon in the spectacular season of 1920, when Ohio State, by two daring forward passes, snatched a 13 to 7 victory from a powerful Wisconsin team when defeat apparently was certain.

Along with the rest of the country, Ohio State pays tribute to Walter Camp for what he was and what he did and for the inspiration he left. How strong his hold still upon the followers of football is evident from the fact that nearly \$3000 has been contributed here voluntarily toward Ohio State's quota for the memorial to be erected to him at Yale.

It is worth recounting some of the contributions he made to football. A four-sport athlete at Yale, he played for that university in the first college Rugby game in America, just 50 years ago. Before he was 20 years of age, he devised the "eleven," the safety as a scoring play, the scrimmage and the quarterback, and injected numerous other changes into the methods of play. It was he who was primarily responsible for the creation of the rules committee, and for many years thereafter contributed to the improvement of the rules.

But his interests were far wider than football, much as he was identified with that game. He was for many years the moving spirit of all Yale athletics, he was a pioneer in the municipal playgrounds idea and in the campaign to improve the health of workers. During the war he was in charge of physical development in all of the navy's training camps and for the air srevice. His greatest ambition was to help "make the nation fit."

Walter Camp exemplified true sportsmanship as perhaps few other Americans have. His point of view has been best described in the sportsman's code as one who—

"Plays the game for his side;

Keeps to the rules;

Keeps a stout heart in defeat;

Keeps faith with his comrades;

Keeps himself fit;


Keeps his temper;


Keeps modest in victory;







The Ohio Stadium

APPROXIMATELY \$70,000 has been expended since last fall to make the Ohio Stadium still more perfect in its arrangements and conveniences for spectators and athletes alike. The Stadium, as it stands, represents a total investment of approximately \$1,800,000, exclusive of the value of the site.

Improvements since last year include the installation of a new drainage system for the playing field, the regrading and resodding of the field for better playing conditions, the repainting of the miles of seats, installation of additional equipment in the training quarters, and permanent provision for heating, shower and electrical facilities in the Stadium.

Salient facts about the Stadium include:

Seats in lower deck, 42,000. Seats in upper deck, 21,000. Box seats, 3,100. Closest seats are 72 feet from the sidelines and the farthest seats only 231 feet.

Circumference, end to end, one-third mile. Ground area, 10 acres.

Height of wall, 98 feet, 3 inches.
Length of structure, 754 feet. Width, 597

Built of concrete and steel.

The audience enters through 81 entrances and is handled by 12 ramps feeding 112 aisles.

It requires an operating force of more than 1,000 ushers, ticket takers, police, Boy Scouts and employes to handle a capacity crowd.

Advantages of the Ohio Stadium plan, the only one of its kind in the country, are (1) that the upper deck brings seats closer to the playing field; (2) that the open end improves ventilation; and (3) that the curved sides equalize seat values.

Architectural features include:

- (1) Eighty-seven concrete and steel arches, each 13 feet wide and 56 feet high.
- (2) Towers are the open end and main enertrance, 109 feet high and 36 feet square.
- (3) A half "doze" 86½ feet high and 70 feet in diameter.







CHANGES IN FOOTBALL RULES

PLAYING BOUNDARIES

The ball becomes dead automatically, no further play being permitted, whenever it crosses the side line, the side line extended or the end line.

INCOMPLETE PASSES

Besides the loss of a down, a penalty of five yards is imposed this season in each instance where a team makes more than one incomplete forward pass during the same series of four downs.

SAFETY

Following a safety, the team scoring through this medium will now put the ball in play by a kick from its own 20-yard line.

CRAWLING

This term has been more clearly defined and is now interpreted as "an attempt by the runner to advance the ball after he has been downed; viz., when any portion of his person except his hands or feet touches the ground while he is in the grasp of an opponent.

PILING UP

This rule has also been clarified and now reads: "There shall be no piling up on a player after the Referee has declared the ball dead or after the player in possession of the ball has been downed and is in the grasp of an opponent."

ROUGHNESS

Rules applying to unnecessary roughness have been amplified for 1926 and so strengthened that there will be no excuse for this practice during the present season.





### COMMON PENALTIES

#### LOSS OF FIVE YARDS

- 1. Violation of the offside rule, which includes:
- (a) Lineman or backs illegally in motion when the ball is snapped.
- (b) Any player of the kicking side ahead of the ball when it is kicked at the kickoff.
- (c) Attempts to draw opponents into charging before the ball is snapped.
- 2. Unreasonable delay by a team, usually evidenced by calling signals several times before the ball is snapped.
- 3. Running into the kicker after he has kicked the ball.
- 4. Failure of substitute to report to referee when entering the game.
- 5. Unfair play not specifically covered in the rules.
- 6. Time called more than four times during a half at the request of the ceptain of the team.
- 7. Defensive player holding an offensive player.
- 8. For each incomplete forward pass during the same series of four downs over the first one. (Only one permitted without penalty.)
- 9. Crawling by the man in possession of the ball.

#### LOSS OF 15 YARDS

- 1. Substitute communicating with players before the ball is put in play.
- 2. Interference with a man who has signaled for a fair catch.
- 3. Throwing player to the ground after he had made a fair catch.
- 4. Offensive player pushing or pulling the man carrying the ball.
- 5. Offensive player holding a defensive player.
- 6. Players of the side making a forward pass interfering with defensive players after the ball is passed.
- 7. Deliberately roughing the kicker after he has kicked the ball.
- 8. Piling up on players who are down.
- 9. Tackling a man after he has run out of bounds.
- 10. Offensive player tripping an opponent.
- 11. Sideline coaching.
- 12. Intentional throwing of forward pass to the ground.
- 13. For hurdling.

#### LOSS OF 25 YARDS

- 1. Clipping.
- 2. Delaying start of first or third periods.

### LOSS OF HALF DISTANCE TO GOAL LINE

- 1. Return of the player to the game who has previously been in that same half.
- 2. Disqualification of a player for rough play.
- 3. Any foul occurring inside the opponent's one-yard line.

#### LOSS OF A DOWN

- 1. Illegal or incomplete forward pass.
- 2. Forward pass striking the ground.
- 3. Forward pass touched by two eligible players of the passing side.
- 4. Forward pass going out of bounds on the fly.
- 5. Recovery of blocked kick by kicking side, regardless of which side blocked it.

#### LOSS OF BALL

- 1. Ball kicked out of bounds unless touched in the field of play.
- 2. Illegal use of hands or arms to prevent an opponent from securing loose ball.
- 3. Forward pass touched by ineligible player of the passer's side.
- 4. Interference by defensive side under a forward pass.
- 5. Failure to advance the ball 10 yards in four
- 6. Kicking or kicking at a loose ball.
- 7. Player on the kicking side who is ahead of the ball when it is kicked and touches the ball before it touches an opponent.

#### FORFEITURE OF GAME

Refusal to abide by referee's decision or to play within two minutes after being ordered to do so by the referee.

#### IMPORTANT NOTE REGARDING TIME OUT

Time is automatically taken out during a try for point after a touchdown, after a safety or a touchback, after fair catch has been made, after an incomplete forward pass, during enforcement of all penalties, when the ball goes out of bounds, or when for any reason play is suspended by the referee. Time shall not begin again, after any of the aforesaid, until the ball is actually passed back from center.


