Fifty Years In The Big Ten

This is the 50th season of Western Conference football.

Over a half century, the Western Conference has grown into one of the strongest intercollegiate conferences in the country. It is strong not only in its teams and individual stars, but in safeguarding the principles of amateurism on which the game was founded.

The first Western Conference season saw the seven founding universities in action. They were Chicago, Minnesota, Michigan, Purdue, Illinois, Wisconsin, and Northwestern. Chicago won the original conference championship.

The following season lowa and Indiana joined and the Conference was known as the Big Nine until 1905, when Michigan withdrew. It became the Big Nine again with the admission of Ohio State in 1913 and the Big Ten when Michigan renewed its membership in 1917. Although Chicago gave up football competition in 1939, the conference still is fondly and familiarly known as the Big Ten.

The first All American selected by Walter Camp from west of the Alleghenies was Clarence Herschberger, Chicago fullback of 1899. The first Midwesterner ever honored three times on the All America was Walter Eckersall, brilliant Maroon quarterback of 1904-'06.

Since "Eckie," it has been a rare year when one or more conference stars were not selected for the All America. There have been seasons when four or five of our players were so honored.

The Conference has been rich in great coaches, whose contributions will live so long as the game is played . . . coaches like Amos Alonzo Stagg, who was one of the founders of the conference; Fielding H. Yost of Michigan; Harry Williams of Minnesota, and Bob Zuppke of Illinois, to name a few. They were the tactical geniuses of their day, whose teams brought national fame to the conference.

But the real foundation of conference football always has been the young men who played the game. On this golden anniversary we pay them tribute; all of them from 1896 to the present moment.

Great on the football fields, Western Conference players, star and scrub alike, have served the country valiantly through two world wars.

They were among the first to join the colors in 1917 and their sacrifices were recorded at the Marne, at Belleau Wood and Cantigny.

In World War II, Big Ten players were in the flood of collegians who were the foundation on which our mighty air arms were built. They were in the van with the Marines at Bougainville and all the way to Okinawa. They were in Africa and Italy and on the beaches of Normandy.

Every member of the conference has heroic sons who will come no more but whose football deeds ever will be a green and warm tradition. Heroes like Ensign Nile Kinnick of Iowa; Lt. Dave Schriner of Wisconsin; Tony Butkovich of Illinois and Purdue and Capt. Don Scott of Ohio State, who played the Greatest Game as they did on Big Ten fields—without fear.

To them and all other football men who served our country we can dedicate this 50th season with the hope that on the golden anniversary of the conference, their sacrifices may have won a golden era af peace.

As football served in times of war, so it must look forward to continued and broader service in the coming years of peace.



Every Western Conference university has planned a postwar expansion of its athletic programs, so that more students, men and women, will have greater opportunities for physical training and physical recreation.

Out of World War I came our magnificent football stadia, dedicated in many instances to the heroes in that conflict. In the coming years we shall see new field houses, gymnasia and play buildings; more swimming pools, tennis courts, soft ball and baseball diamonds. We will see more varsity football teams, junior and lightweight elevens; more contestants in track and other sports.

Physical conditioning is recognized as an integral part of a well rounded education and the Western Conference will not be found lacking in facilities.

Football is the king of intercollegiate sports. More than any other it typifies the competitive spirit inherent in all Americans: actively for those on the fields and vicariously for those of us who sit on the stands. We thrill to the spirit and speed of American youth; to the long punt and pass.

Let us hope that the first 50 years of Western Conference football are just its infancy, that it will continue to grow and serve its schools, states and nation as it has in the past.





The Visiting Hawkeyes

Clem F. Crowe comes back to Ohio today. The state was his home for ten years, 1932 to 1942, when he was on the coaching staff at Xavier University of Cincinnati.

He returns as acting head coach of the University of lowa football squad, a job he took last March on a two-year contract.

At Xavier, he took over the head coaching position in a tough spot. After four games of the 1935 season, he was given the head post and his team won the rest of its games, holding opponents to one touchdown.

In 1942, with the nation at war, Xavier abandoned athletics for the duration. When he left, Coach Crowe had seen his teams win 45 games, lose 26, and tie twice for a percentage of .633.

The Indiana-born coach, first of six Crowe brothers of Lafayette to compete at Notre Dome between 1923 and 1939, makes his bow to the Big Ten when his Hawkeyes meet Ohio State this afternoon.

Familiar with rugged spots and apparently not especially interested in avoiding them, Coach Crowe this season is trying mightily to inject some "Victory Year" tonic into the rother anemic Hawkeye grid situation.

He ond the players are not thinking of the post two years, when the manpower-short lowons won only two games and tied one out of sixteen.

Coach Crowe secured Arthur "Bud" Boeringer, 1926 Notre Dame all-American center, as line coach and with the help of Glenn Devine and Maury Kent, who already were on the lowa staff, drilled the squad in four weeks of August practice.

The staff had to start almost from scratch, because there were only five major letter men available and only two of these were even regulars on the 1944 team. The "T" formation has been installed, with modifications to fit the material.

Conditioning work is one of the specialities of the new coach. His men must be in shape for 60 minutes of play—or they will be immobilized on the bench.

After fall drill opened Sept. 10, the over-all picture improved. Addition of new players was one help. Development of other men was another asset.

The squad, in general, is more mature than the "grid-kids" of 1943 and 1944. Ex-service men total 17 and about 20 of the athletes ore 20 years old or more. But the talented material still is thin; the old trouble of shollowness of reserves has not yet been overcome.

In the backfield, which probably will start, are four discharged veterons, headed by 26-year-old Jerry Niles,

veteran of three years of dive bombing in the Pacific as a navy pilot. Big Jerry is the veteran of veterans, for he was fullback on the 1938 lowa teom for half the season, then center for the remainder. With his 190 pounds and rugged build, he is an ideal man for the vital quarterback spot in "T" stuff.

Jack Kelso, regular 1944 end, now is left halfbock. He was the first mon to enter the university under the Gl bill. Right halfback is Nelson Smith, formerly of the army air corps, who was leading scorer for lowa in 1944. Fullback is Arthur Johnson, nearly four years in the army air corps, who twice was captured by the Germans and twice escaped. He was a reserve fullback on the 1940 and 1941 squads and after he reported Sept. 19, quickly took over at fullback because of his size, experience and Crive.

Looking down the line, left to right, the players are Ralph Woodard, 18-year-old brother of Dick, 1944 halfback; Andy Novosad, 225-pound war veteron who played on the lowa freshman team in 1942; Harold McNamara, 180-pound much-decoroted ormy flier; Jack Hommond, 220-pound youngster at center; Paul Fagerlind, 170-pound regulor from 1944, who wos second in the NCAA javelin throw last spring; Bill Kay, 205-pound freshman, and Bob Gustafson, ex-service man, who played with Novosad on the 1942 yearling team

Some of the other Hawkeye linemen certain to get in the game are: Dick Meyer, pass-catching left end; Bill Guilfoyle, only navy man on the squad, a dental senior, at left tackle; Louis Ginsberg and Bruce Hamman, left guards; Ronnie Wolf, Kentucky bay, at center; Wayne Spurbeck, right guard; Ralph Katz, "I" mon at right tackle, who is stone deaf, and Carl Bowen, former all-state back, now right end.

Some of the lowa ball-carrying will be done by Obern Simons, 17-pound Negro army veteran, who can move fast; Clayton Colbert, onother veteran, who never played football in high school; Herbert Braun, fullback, who played in seven Minnesota games last foll while a noval trainee there; John Hunter, quarter miler from the trock team; Jim Skophammer, rugged army airman with several decorations; and Jim Harding, No. 2 quarterback, who served in the infantry.

Just as they did in 1944, the lowans stort their conference schedule of six games with this battle in the Buckeye stadium. It was 34-0 for the Bucks a year ogo, as the young lowans, taking their first look at the vast stadium and the Ohio State team, were somewhot mesmerized.

By now the Howkeyes have tried their "stuff" in a game with Bergstrom AAF Troop Carriers of Austin, Tex., and feel far better qualified to battle the Bucks in this eleventh game of the series. Manhattan Shirts
