

RECRUITING and subsidizing are terms with evil connotations in intercollegiate athletics. But this should not necessarily be so. Recruiting—seeking out prospective students who may bring credit to a college, and subsidization—financial aid to deserving students, are important and highly respectable activities as institutions of higher learning compete to enroll the finest types of individuals for their student bodies.

The evil connotations of the terms, particularly in athletics, come about through the exercise of undue pressures in recruiting and the granting of unwarranted and unauthorized aids.

What is proper and what is improper in the way of recruiting and subsidizing athletes has long been a subject of study and legislation in the Big Ten and other conferences. Too few people understand that there are entirely proper methods of recruitment and aids, and likewise too few people are fully aware of the limits which Conference regulations place upon them.

The Big Ten holds that it is honorable and constructive for a boy to work to help defray his college expenses and a school may provide work, either on or off the campus. The simple requirement in the rules is that an athlete must actually work on the job for which he is paid, and that he be paid no more than the going rate for such work.

Further, the Conference recognizes that the athlete may receive unearned aid based upon recognition of his extracurricular achievements. The key requirements are that all such aid must be administered by the institution as are all other student

awards, that the terms of the award be published, and that in all cases the awards be keyed to some degree of academic accomplishment.

The scholarship requirements for awards to Big Ten athletes are a C average (or upper half of high school class) for aid which does not exceed the amount of tuition, and a B-C average (or upper third of high school class) for aid which exceeds tuition but may not exceed the cost of attending a school for one year.

In the field of recruiting the premise of Big Ten regulations is that, while correspondence may be employed to explain educational and financial aid opportunities, the proper place for interviews is on the campus. Accordingly, coaches and staff members may not go off the campus for interviews. Boys are encouraged to come to the campus by a provision which permits the school to provide two nights lodging and meals on the occasion of a campus visit.

The proper interest of alumni and friends in prospective athletes is recognized as they, individually, may bring boys to the campus to meet staffs and inspect facilities. But the Conference prohibits alumni or friends of the school pooling funds to finance such visits.

It is a surprise to most people who become acquainted with Conference regulations that the rules tend to be as liberal as they are. Many alumni, who have somehow become indoctrinated to the notion that the only way they can show their interest in a deserving athlete is by slipping something under the table to a boy or to an undercover fund, are surprised and pleased to know that regulations permit and in fact encourage contributions to funds that are to be administered by the university as needed aid to worthy and qualified student-athletes.

Personnel Of The Hawkeyes

TACKLE *Frank Bloomquist* and Center *Donn Buck* both made all-state in 1953, when they were teammates at East Waterloo . . . both are sophomores . . . Bloomquist also made high school All-American at East . . . End *Jim Young* is another

Waterloo native, but he played his prep ball at West high . . . Captain *Cal Jones* spent his summer working on the stadium, painting and repairing seats . . . So Cal will have had a hand in making Iowa fans happy in more ways than one through the season . . . He was in Iowa City undergoing treatment on the wrist which was injured in '54.

The Steubenville trio, Jones, *Eddie Vincent*, and *Frank Gilliam*, put their town on the map in a big way in '54 . . .

Jones took virtually every All-American guard post in the book . . . *Gilliam* and *Vincent* got several all-midwest mentions . . . For a town of 35,000, that's about par for the course . . . There are two brother acts on the Iowa roster this year . . . Best known, of course, is the *Reichow-Reichow* combination, *Jerry* and *Bill* . . . *Harlan* and *Jerry Jenkinson* of Waterloo form the other family combo . . . *Harlan*, the elder, is a two-year vet of football and wrestling at Iowa, and *Jerry* is an end.

Halfback *Ken Ploen* of Clinton seems to be tops at everything he tries . . . Had things his own way in his home town as a senior, when he won all-state and all-America recognition in football, all-state

rating in basketball, and a pair of state hurdles championships . . . He threw a touchdown pass the first time he got his hands on the ball at Iowa, and completed 5 of 9 for the best percentage on the club.

Rog Wiegmann, the veteran fullback, does not confine his activities to the gridiron . . . He's also serving this year as president of the University's Inter-fraternity Council and holding down a near "B" average in a mathematics major . . . Guard *George Kress* will turn 21 two days before the Wisconsin game.

Add unusual Hawk-eye birthdays: Junior tackle *Jim Willett* and sophomore tackle *Ernie Karlenzig* are New Year's babies . . . or were . . . Willett was born in the first day of 1936, Karlenzig one year later to the day . . . *Jerry* and *Bill Reichow* have no trouble remembering the other's birthday . . . the two brothers were born on the same day, May 19 . . . *Bill* was born in '29, *Jerry* in '34 . . . Lightest man on the Iowa squad this year is halfback *Phil Leahy*, at 160 pounds . . . the heaviest guard *Alex Karras* at 235, one more than last year's heavyweight, *Jim Freeman* . . . Shortest squadman is a tie among Center *Donn Buck*, Halfback *Mike Hagler*, and Guard *Gary Kurdelmeier* at 5-9, and tallest men are Guard *John Burroughs*, End *Freeman*, Tackle *Carroll Johnson*, End *Frank Rigney*, and Tackle *Jim Willett*, all at 6-4.



The University of Iowa



FOUNDED two months after Iowa became a state in December of 1846, the State University of Iowa is located in Iowa City on hills overlooking the Iowa River. Old Capitol, first capitol building of Iowa, has symbolized the close relationship of the state and the school since it became the center of University life in 1857.

The school, like the state, was founded by pioneers, and the forward-looking spirit that made both possible continues to find expression in the accomplishments of the University today, which has pioneered many educational advances, including the development of courses of study designed to meet the individual needs of students who are fitted for such programs by their interests and skills.

Typical of the cooperation among the State University of Iowa's more than sixty departments is the training given Iowa students in speech correction. Their studies take them to the Colleges of Medicine and Dentistry; the School of Social Work; the Departments of Speech, Psychology and Physics; the Student Counseling Office; and the Reading Clinic.

Research in such University units as the Iowa Child Welfare Research Station, the Radiation Research Laboratory and the Iowa Institute of Hydraulic Research has brought leaders from around the world to "see how it is done" at Iowa.

The newest research unit to be established at the State University of Iowa is the nation's first Institute of Agricultural Medicine, which will conduct medical and social research on the diseases to which farm people are especially susceptible and develop new preventive measures to safeguard the farmer's health.

The atmosphere of freedom and the urge to experiment with the new and better also finds expression at the University in the School of Religion, which pioneered almost 30 years ago in the principle of inter-faith teaching.

Located on the west bank of the Iowa river, which "bisects" the campus, is the University Medical Center. The center is comprised of three hospitals—University General Hospital, Children's Hospital and Psychopathic Hospital, the Hospital-School for Severely Handicapped Children, the Medical Laboratories Building and a Medical Research Building now being constructed. A unique feature of the Medical Center is the ambulance service by which it brings patients for treatment from all Iowa's 99 counties, with nearly 21,000 persons being so transported last year alone.

The continuing growth of the University of Iowa has demanded a corresponding enlargement of the campus and its physical facilities.

When the Old Capitol building was turned over to the University, it was the only building on a ten-acre campus. Today, approximately 8,500 students attend classes in more than 60 permanent buildings on the 706-acre campus. The ten colleges—Liberal Arts, Law, Commerce, Education, Medicine, Nursing, Dentistry, Engineering, Pharmacy and Graduate—and the four schools—Journalism, Fine Arts, Religion and Social Work—offer together more than 1,300 courses.

Such has been the growth of a University which, like its state, has come to play a significant role in American life.




