BEFORE THE GAME

Twenty-seven Ohio State seniors will be making their final appearance in Ohio Stadium today when the top-ranked Buckeyes (8-0) host the University of Iowa Hawkeyes. It is only appropriate that this group is heavily favored to win today's encounter and close out its career on a winning note — winning has been a tradition for this class. Consider its accomplishments.

In three years this class has won 23 of 29 college football games against schools from five major conferences. As good as that record is, it might easily have been better except that injuries took an almost unbelievable toll in 1971 when the Buckeyes jumped off to a 6-1 start but struggled home with three straight losses and a 6-4 record.

In three years this class has won 18 Big Ten football games and lost just four. Included in that list is a Big Ten championship and a subsequent trip to the Rose Bowl. Three of those losses came in 1971, the fourth last season at Michigan State.

In three years this class has won 14 of 17 games in Ohio Stadium, including 11 in a row since a 14-10 loss to Northwestern in — that's right — 1971. Included in that eleven game streak is last year's 14-11 victory over "that team up North" that has to rank as one of the greatest games ever played in Ohio Stadium.

In three years this class has helped rush for 7,731 yards, score 111 touchdowns, amassed 824 points — all brilliant figures. Defensively it has yielded just 269 points.

In three years this class has produced some great individual athletes. Some are well known, others are not — all have contributed to the success of this class. It also has produced some fine students as evidenced by Randy Gradishar's recent winning of the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame scholarship.

Three years ago as this group of young men embarked on what was then an uncertain football career at Ohio State University, they must have wondered about the future. Now that future has become history. They will wear the Scarlet and Gray for the last time today when they enter stately old Ohio Stadium.

A win this afternoon would make nine straight this season as they head into next week's grand finale at Ann Arbor where a victory would set the stage for a second consecutive Rose Bowl appearance and the possibility of just the fifth unbeaten season in Ohio State history. Should that become reality, this class might easily add a National Championship to its already impressive list of accomplishments.

There is little doubt that this year's Ohio State team is the best in several years. It has rushed for more yards, will rush for more touchdowns and has allowed fewer points than any team in Ohio State history. This senior class has been a vital part of that success whether actually playing or on the sidelines.

In three years this class has done well for itself and for Ohio State University.

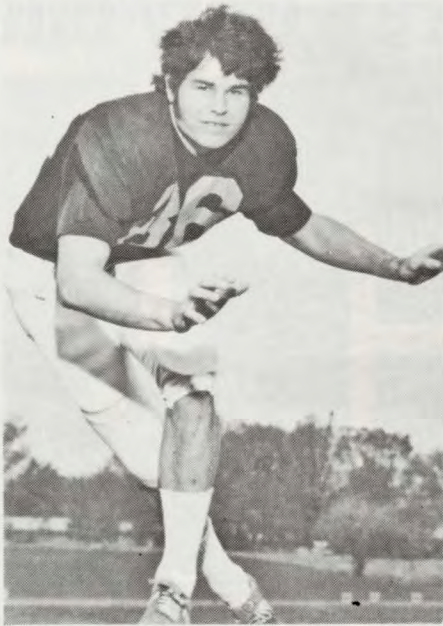

DAN DICKEL — DEFENSIVE END — A two year letterman for the Hawkeyes and this year's defensive captain. Was selected MVP last year when he had 15 tackles behind the line of scrimmage for a minus 57 yards. Has 70 tackles this season, including seven sacks.



ANDRE JACKSON — LINEBACKER — Led the Big Ten in tackles last year as a freshman with 144 total participations and had 83 solos and 88 assists on the year. Was a walk-on at the beginning of the season but soon found a permanent home with the defense. Had four games last year in which he had over 20 tackles. Has been injured much of this season but still has 78 tackles.

ARCHIE GRIFFIN — TAILBACK — Has rushed for over 100 yards in each of the Buckeyes' first eight games including 131 against Michigan State last week. Griffin, a sophomore, is one of three Ohio State backs ever to go over the 1,000 yard mark in one season. He currently has 1,019 and is closing in on the Buckeyes' single season mark of 1,142 set in 1970 by John Brockington.



NEAL COLZIE — DEFENSIVE HALFBACK — A 6-2 junior speedster from Coral Gables, Fla., Colzie stunned Michigan State last week with eight punt returns for 170 yards and one touchdown. Colzie has now scored two touchdowns on the year via punt returns and has amassed 504 return yards. The latter places him third on Ohio State's all-time list, just 33 yards short of the career leader.

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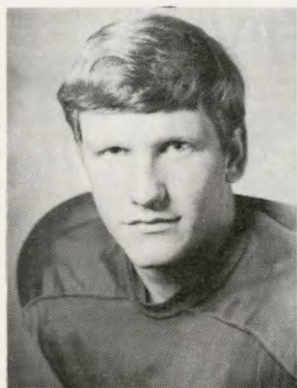
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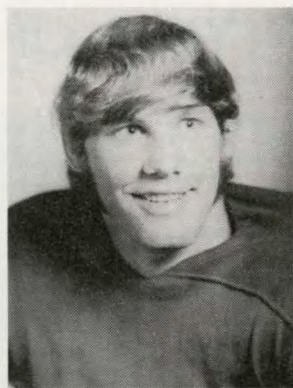
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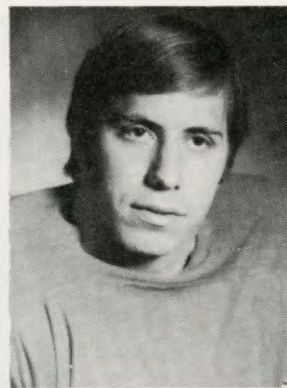

SCOUTMASTER IN 51ST YEAR OF SERVICE



Ernie Hawbecker directs the football ushering program.

For 51 years now the Boy Scouts of Central Ohio have served in Ohio Stadium as the official ushers at Ohio State University football games. And for 51 years E. P. "Ernie" Hawbecker has been supervising those Scouts, first as a section leader and for the past 22 years as Director of the Scout Ushering Service.

That, in itself, is a remarkable achievement. Even more remarkable, is that in those 51 seasons, Ernie Hawbecker has missed just one Ohio State football game.

"That was about 16 years ago against Iowa," recalls the 76-year old Hawbecker. "My niece chose that day to get married so I had to miss the game. But I haven't missed one since and I don't plan to miss any in the future.

Hawbecker, a native of Columbus and a 1915 graduate of Milo High School, first became affiliated with the Boy Scouts in 1920.

"I have always been interested in the youth of our city, state and nation," he explains. "As a result of that interest I accepted an invitation to become an assistant scoutmaster here in Columbus. It is a decision that I will never regret because scouting and the boys in it have been a real joy for me over the years."

Hawbecker, who lives at 85 Acton, has held numerous positions in the Boy Scout hierarchy since that first job as assistant scoutmaster. He has since served as Unit Committeeman, Commissioner of the Northeast District, District Chairman and presently is a member of the Executive Council.

But one of his greatest loves has been the Scout Ushering Service and he still vividly remembers the circumstances surrounding its beginning.

"There was some concern about the great number of people who would be at the dedication of Ohio Stadium and the newness of the seating arrangement. So it was decided that the Boy Scouts would become ushers," Hawbecker notes.

"My troop was involved and of course both the Boy Scouts and I have been privileged to continue this service ever since."

Hawbecker's first assignment in Ohio Stadium was supervisor of the temporary bleachers located at the open end of the giant horseshoe.

"There was such a demand for tickets for the dedication game that it was necessary to erect extra bleachers that day," he says. "What a thrill to see over 71,000 fans streaming into the Stadium, a far cry from the 12,000 we used to get at old Ohio Field."

Through the years Hawbecker acted as supervisor in many sections of the Stadium. Then in 1951 he was named assistant director of the ushering service (to former Columbus Mayor M. E. Sensenbrenner) and the following year was appointed director of that service.

There have been a number of changes in 51 years of ushering according to Hawbecker.

"The big change is the required increase in manpower," he points out. "We used to be able to do the job with about two hundred men, but now it requires approximately 750 Scouts and 150 supervisors per game. It has become quite an operation."

Hawbecker likes to point out that the scouts provide other services in addition to ushering.

"All of our boys are trained in first aid," he says. "And over the years it has been very useful. We have had heart attacks, accidents, heat exhaustion and many other emergencies come up and our young men always acted calmly and professionally."

"We also act as kind of a lost and found service, by turning in lost or left articles to the ticket office."

"Our theme is Civic Service and we always try to live up to it," he concludes.

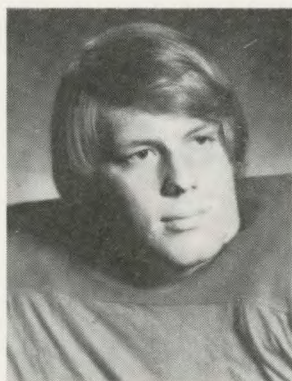

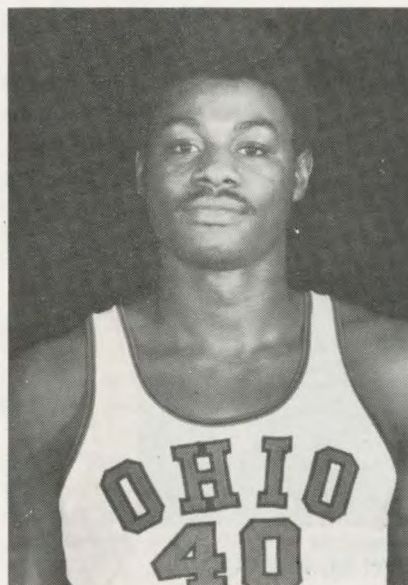
The Ohio State University basketball team will open its 1973-74 season Nov. 30 in St. John Arena. The University of Texas at Arlington is the first opponent on the Buckeyes' attractive eleven game home schedule which also includes N.I.T. runnerup Notre Dame and Big Ten Champion Indiana.

Coach Fred Taylor, the Dean of the Big Ten coaches, begins his sixteenth season at the Buckeye helm with seven returning lettermen, all of whom started at least one game on last season's 14-10 team.

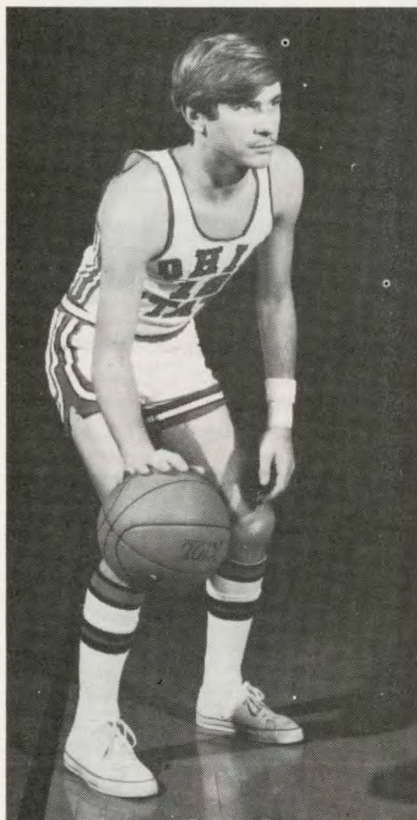
Senior captain Wardell Jackson heads the list of returnees. The high jumping, 6-7 forward scored 13.2 points per game last year and pulled down 164 rebounds. He is a fine scorer, an excellent defender and a good team player.

Other letter winners include junior Bill Andreas (6-7) and sophomore Craig Taylor (6-10) at center, senior Jack Wolfe and junior Steve Wenner, both 6-6, at forward and senior guards Dan Gerhard (6-3) and Gary Repella (6-2).

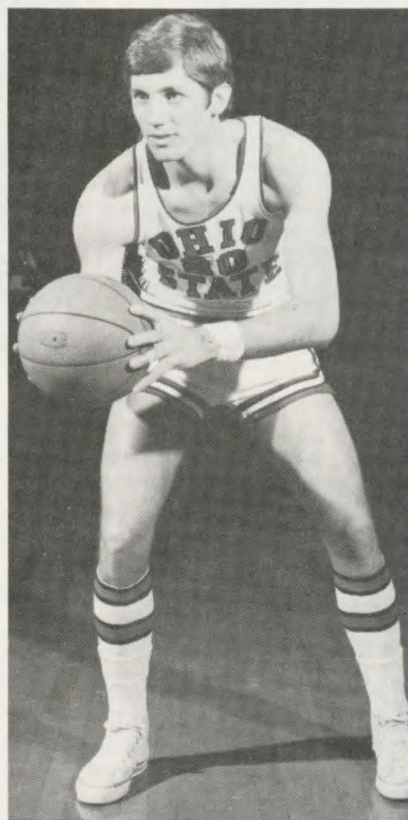

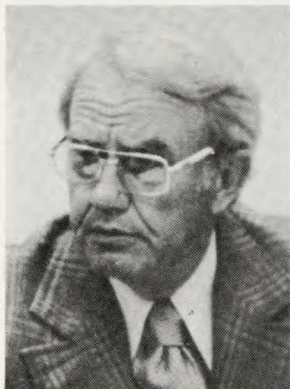

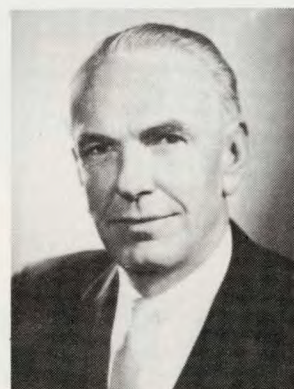
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Owens' Olympic Performance Tops In Twentieth Century

Early this year, a national panel of sports writers and broadcasters was asked to vote in a poll rating the top 10 sports stories of the Twentieth Century.

First on the list when the votes were counted was Jesse Owens' track and field performance in the 1936 Olympics at Berlin, when he won four gold medals.

Fourth, in an amazing concession of historic status to a contemporary event, was Mark Spitz's seven-gold swimming performance at the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich.

In between were Roger Bannister's four-minute mile breakthrough in 1954 and Bobby Thomson's playoff home run for the New York Giants in 1951 — thus establishing the Owens and Spitz performances as an impartial judging body's choice as the two greatest American amateur athletic efforts in 72 years.

Chauvinism may be in ill favor these days, but consider the common thread uniting the two sporting giants—Owens and Spitz, sons of the Big Ten.

Nothing else the Big Ten has done in Olympic competition comes close to the achievements of Owens of Ohio State and Spitz of Indiana, nor does anything else by anyone else from anywhere else.

But the Big Ten's Olympic heritage is rich and old. Male athletes from the conference have brought home 100 gold medals, including the 11 Spitz and his Indiana swimming teammates collected at Munich.

At least eight more have been collected by women who attended Big Ten schools, the latest, diver Micki King of Michigan, springboard champion at Munich.

Every school in the conference is included on the gold-medal list, including former member Chicago.

The Big Ten was formed in 1896, and charter member Wisconsin supplied the first gold medalist from the conference — Alvin Kraenzlein, who competed at both Wisconsin and Pennsylvania and won the high hurdles and long jump in the 1900 Games at Paris. Kraenzlein later coached the Badgers.

In the 1904 Olympics at St. Louis, America's hero was a Michigan sprinter, Archie Hahn.

Hahn, who, as a freshman, won the first event contested in the first Big Ten track and field championship meet at Marshall Field in Chicago in 1901, won his '04 golds in the sprints — the 60-meter dash (discontinued at Olympic competition after that year), the 100-meter and the 200-meter.

Michigan provided three other 1904 gold medalists in "athletics," the Olympic name for track and field — Ralph Rose, a 6-5,

230-pound strongman, in the shot put, Frederick Schule in the 110-meter high hurdles and Charles Dvorak in the pole vault. It was altogether a rather stunning effort, considering Michigan won the Big Ten title that year by just three points over Chicago, which had its own historic member in that Olympics.

The Maroons' James Lightbody won both the 800 and 1,500-meter runs, a rare double. American Melvin Sheppard matched it in 1908 at London, and since then, no U.S. runner has won the 1,500, the "metric mile," let alone the 800-1,500 double.

In 1908, Rose repeated in the shot put and may have been involved in a precedent-setting Olympic incident. Some say it was the husky Rose, other historians claim it was a feisty little gymnast named Albert Joachim, who carried the U.S. flag in the opening ceremonies and started a tradition by refusing to join other competing nations by dipping his nation's flag when passing in front of the reviewing King of England. Whoever the nationalistic U.S. flag bearer was, he is said to have snapped:

"This flag dips to no earthly king."

It still doesn't. In Berlin in 1936, the U.S. flag bearer drew low whistles and stomping, the German equivalent of American boos, when he continued the tradition, marching by Adolf Hitler without a dip. It was the custom through 1968; now, it's a U.S. law.

Big Ten athletes won four gold medals at Stockholm in 1912, two by Michigan's Ralph Craig in the 100 and 200 meters.

In 1916 and 1920, the Big Ten was

blanked. Since then, through 11 straight Olympics, Big Ten stars have won gold medals — never less than two and a high of 12, achieved in the 1952 Games at Helsinki, Finland.

In 1960 at Rome, 1968 at Mexico City and 1972 at Munich, the conference's male athletes brought back 11 golds.

But where track and field was the source of the conference's early gold supply, the emphasis has shifted to swimming — and primarily to the all-conquering program of Coach James (Doc) Counsilman at Indiana.

Of the 27 golds won by Big Ten male athletes at the last three Olympics, the only two not won by swimmers or divers were taken by basketball players Bill Hosket of Ohio State and John Clawson of Michigan in 1968. And, of the 25 swimming and diving golds in those three Games, only four were won by non-Indiana athletes — platform diver Bob Webster of Michigan in '64, 200-meter butterflyer Carl Robie of Michigan in '68, and double-relay anchorman Ken Walsh of Michigan State in '68.

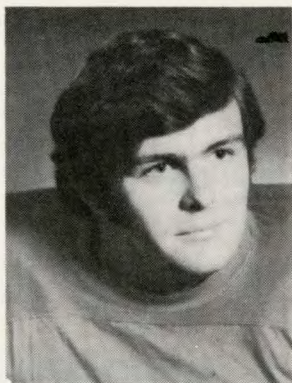
With that latterday bonanza, Indiana has taken the Big Ten lead in gold medals with 32 to 21 for Ohio State and 16 for Michigan. The Hoosiers' breakdown shows 14 in individual events, 17 in relays and one in a team event (Walt Bellamy in basketball in 1960).

Michigan's total includes 15 in individual events, the Big Ten's high in that category. The Wolverines' list includes a unique distinction — three men who have pulled off the 100-200 track and field sprint double. After Hahn ('04) and Craig ('12) came Eddie Tolan in 1932. Since the Games were reinstituted in 1896, only four other men have done that — Owens in '36, Canadian Percy Williams in '28, American Bobby Morrow in '56 and Russia's Valeri Borzov in '72.

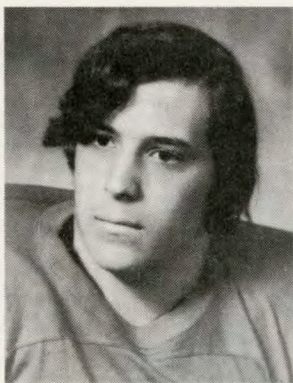
The Big Ten had a prominent role in one of the most dramatic team victories the U.S. has achieved in the Olympics — the hockey gold medal the plucky Americans won in 1960 when they upset Russia in the final game. Jack McCarten of Minnesota was the goalie, and the Gophers' John Mayasich and Richard Meredith and Michigan State's Weldon Olson and Gene Grazia were other team members.

The league also was prominent on what has been called the greatest basketball team ever assembled — the 1960 U.S. Olympic squad, which included Ohio State's Jerry Lucas, Purdue's Terry Dischinger and Indiana's Bellamy as well as players like Oscar Robertson, Jerry West, Bob Boozer, Darral Imhoff and Adrian Smith.

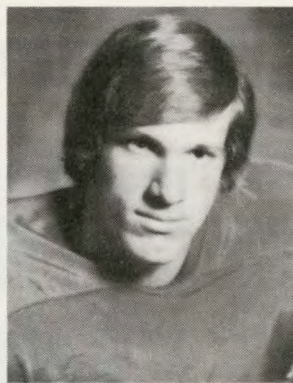

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Herky and the Hawkeyes



The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawk-eye was originally applied to a hero in a fictional novel, **The Last of the Mohicans**, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Author Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived and hunted with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James G. Edwards of Ft. Madison. Edwards, editor of the Ft. Madison **Patriot**, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the **Burlington Hawk-Eye**. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name and were rewarded when territorial officials gave it their formal approval.

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawk, was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism. The impish hawk was an immediate hit and he acquired a name through a state-wide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 20 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot with a black leather head and gold felt feathers. Since then Herky has become a familiar figure at Hawkeye athletic events.

University Scientists Work to Replace Power Lines With Giant Ducts

Meeting the continent's power crisis will require not only increased electrical generating capacity but also many more ultra-high-voltage transmission lines criss-crossing the landscape to distribute the power.

A new type of air-filled duct transmission line under study at Ohio State University could eliminate the blight of these overhead high-voltage lines, engineers believe, while providing better performance and economy.

Ontario Hydro of Toronto, Canada, is pioneering the duct line concept. Work in the U.S. lags except at Ohio State University, according to OSU electrical engineers Robert Devore, John Kraus, Stephen Sebo and Barry Weedy, who are studying its capabilities.

"The new duct line has advantages over both overhead and conventional buried cables," according to Prof. Kraus.

"One duct line 8 feet in diameter can replace six 345,000-volt overhead lines requiring 1000 feet right-of-way," he said. "Radio and TV interference, corona effects and ozone production are also virtually eliminated. The duct line is versatile. It can be completely buried, partly buried, above ground, or above ground but below grade as circumstances dictate."

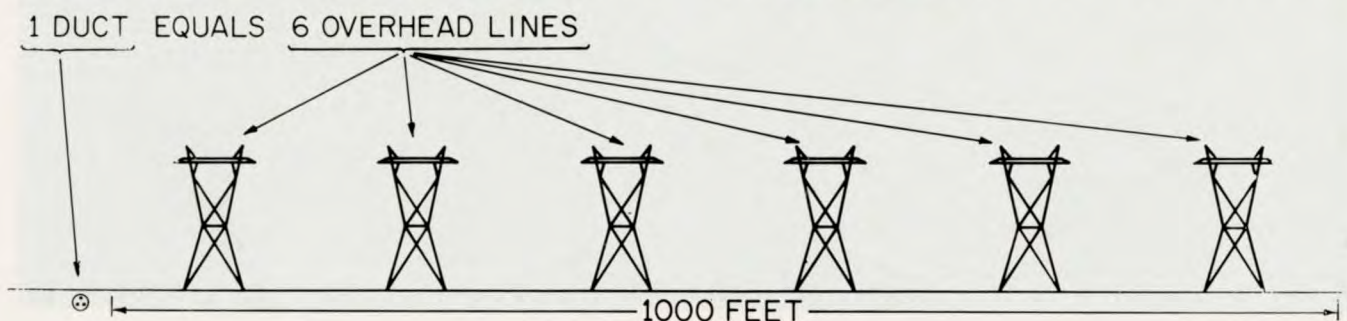
Another important advantage of the duct over

conventional buried cables is that it is large enough to permit easy access by maintenance personnel.

Dr. Marlin O. Thurston, chairman of Ohio State's electrical engineering department, calls the duct line "a long overdue development in electrical transmission technology."

Tests at Ohio State have included construction of a test section of corrugated steel pipe 7 feet in diameter with three aluminum conductors 1 foot in diameter arranged symmetrically inside. Tests have also been made of different insulator designs and studies are in progress involving heat transfer and ventilation. Dry, clean air acts as the insulating medium. At Ontario Hydro, where feasibility studies of their duct line are being made, the project is referred to as DAMUT, for "Ducted Air-Medium Underground Transmission."

Prof. Kraus believes the duct line appears to be both technically and economically attractive and hopes that the Ohio State group can help accelerate its development and application. "Solid, oil filled, or compressed gas cables do not have the power handling capability or ease of maintenance of the duct line while superconducting cables are many years in the future," he said. "The duct line offers the only hope for planning to put the big power lines underground now."

HAPPY 35TH BIRTHDAY, BLOCK "O"

To most of the fans sitting in the Ohio Stadium this year, this is just another super football season, but not so for those who are sitting in Sections 1A and 2A. This year marks the 35th birthday of the Block "O" organization, the official flash card and cheering section for Ohio State football games, which makes its home in those Sections.

The "Block" was founded in 1938 by Clancy Isaacs. Isaacs had first become interested in such an organization in the early 30's when he was head cheerleader. According to Clancy, his reason was simple. "If the Bucks had the greatest marching band in the land, why not have the greatest cheering section also!"

The Block has had many homes since its conception including stops in 17A, 15A, 13A, and 11A. It has been at its present north end position since 1967.

Block "O" is made up of 1,424 members, but only 1100 members are in the actual flashing section. Still it is one of the largest cheering sections in the country.

Prior to the 1970 football season the Block became a computerized organization, under the direction of that year's president, Richard D. Boggs. In this system, the stunts are drawn on special graph paper and then transferred to computer cards by use of a keypunch machine and a special color code system. The information is then fed into the IBM computer which in turn prints out individual instruction sheets for each person in the Block. The Block president decides the stunts to be called as well as when they will be called. The members are told ahead of time which stunts are being used.

Most of the decision making for the organization is done by the Executive Committee which is headed by the President, Mary "Sadie" Cornwell.

Besides flashing cards, the Block also maintains the University mascot, "Brutus the Buckeye". The responsibility of getting the dancing Buckeye to both games and away games rests with its chairman, Jack E. Tamburello. Block "O" also maintains cheering sections for both Basketball and Hockey. Basketball block or "Mini Block" as it is called in its sixth year. This section is directed by Mitsi Mash, a senior from Marion, Ohio, and it promises to be strong in cheering on the Basketball Bucks.

This year the Block started a pilot program for the Hockey team. Research for this section began last winter quarter, by Sherry J. Shulok. Sherry, a senior from the Massillon-Canton area, is Chairwoman of the "Mini Puck" organization, as it is being called. The Block "O" office is located in the Ohio Union, room 304. 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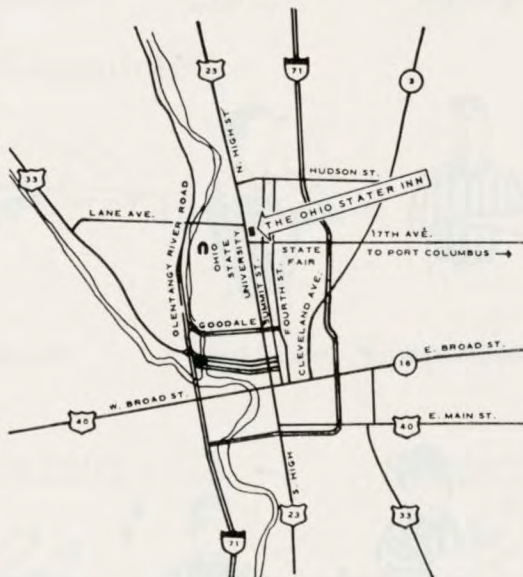
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College Football "Plays It Again" Sunday

As it is popularly conceived, the instant replay is a split-screened, isolated, slo-mo, stop-action piece of art which lets you see the play you didn't see a few seconds earlier.

But popular conceptions are far too confining. An instant replay—in every sense of the term—takes place every Sunday morning on most ABC stations. It even has a name—ABC College Football Highlights Show.

Putting the Sunday morning highlights show together is a game in itself; and when you consider that the "working day" in Chicago for the show is 11 p.m. Saturday until 11 a.m. Sunday, you can bet it's the only game in town.

For at least three members of the Highlights Show team, it's an away game. Dick Snider, director of NCAA Films and executive producer of the show, checks into Chicago Saturday night from his home in Wichita, Kan. Kemper Peacock, the producer-director, journeys from New York; and Bill Flemming, the host, comes from his assignment on ABC's college football telecast of the week.

Snider minimizes his role in the production, but the five-year reign of the show is to his credit. "You know, the whole thing's impossible," he confesses. "The good thing is that we never have time to stop and think about that when we are putting the show together."

Snider's involvement with the show really begins the Monday before. That's when he huddles with ABC executives to determine what games will be featured.

"We'll film on the average of 12 games a weekend, and then pick the five or six top games. Those games are determined on the importance of the contest, logistics or even if one of the teams has a player everybody would like to see.

"The most important thing about the show," Snider continued, "is getting the film into Chicago. When I get there Saturday night, I contact the cameramen and find out what flights the film's going to be on. Then I make sure that our messengers—who race to O'Hare and Midway airports on motorcycles—get out there and get the film.

Important Motorcycles

"Kemper Peacock has been all over the world and has to be one of the best in the business. Bill Flemming has covered every major sporting event in the world, and I've been around a little, too; but we all are helpless if one of those guys in a helmet and leather jacket can't get his bike started."

In the five years the show has been on the air, only one shipment of film has been lost in transit. "I know the plane schedules into Chicago better than the airlines," says Snider, "but sometimes things go wrong. We had an important game coming in from the South on Piedmont Airlines. It arrived on time, but the messenger didn't, and Piedmont closed down its baggage counter. We had to call Piedmont's home office, get the manager's name

in Chicago, get him out of bed and down to O'Hare."

Kemper Peacock is the head of a production company by the same name. "I know I'm good with deadlines but this is ridiculous," Peacock said as he sat at a desk surrounded by some of his own photography. "It's tough, but we get it done. I work with three editors in Chicago on the show. I'll edit the main game—the one we spotlight—and the rest of the work is parcelled out to the others. We have roughly four hours to do the work . . . and we do it. That's all."

Each cameraman provides a play-by-play account of the game with the film. It's up to Peacock to edit the footage into an exciting, five-minute piece.

"At 4:30 a.m. we transfer the material from film to video-tape and have our first run through. Bill Flemming arrives on the scene between 5:30 and 6 a.m.; and we must have the show completed by 10 a.m. We have roughly three hours to get everything right. We have the edited film and any other features that I might have worked on in New York that we have to get into the show. But, Bill's got to get his narration in; and we have late scores to include. You know, it just might be impossible."

WLS, the ABC affiliate in Chicago, has to have the show by 10 a.m. to insure at least one run through. But, the station has been persuaded to take the show later.

Show Must Go On

"Our record is 10:57," Peacock admitted. "WLS had 'Water Skiing from Cypress Garden' all racked up, ready to run. But, we made it. We've made every show."

The "interior linemen" of the show are the writers. Jeff Elliott, who doubles as the assistant director of the Big Ten Service Bureau, and Kay Schultz, Chicago journalist, spend their time looking over shoulders and getting people out of bed.

"I just try to compile as much information as possible," Elliott explains, "and when you work through the night, that means disturbing some people."

Flemming is the man up front. According to Snider, "He is super. He's one of the few sportscasters who could do this show. He knows the game, and you can't shake him up."

Flemming smiled at this comment and said, "They do call me 'one-shot Flemming.' Let's face it, that's my strength. I can get the thing done in one take. And fifty per cent of the time, that's all we have time for."

Flemming is on the college football scene every Saturday afternoon working a game for ABC. After the game he hops into his own plane and heads for Chicago.

"Flying my own plane is the only way to do it," says Flemming. "Even so, sometimes I have to leave at half-time, or before, to make it. It's amazing, but I've never been weathered out. I've had some bumpy flights, but Chicago has always been open for me."

Upon arrival in Chicago, Flemming reads the first edition of the Tribune to get a bead on some of the games. Preparation is his hallmark. He compiles information throughout the week on the games which will probably be used then adlibs this information during the taping of the show.

After getting a wake-up call at 4:30 a.m., Flemming heads over to begin the taping. He gets the script outline then the cameras roll. Often the narration is material Flemming is seeing for the first time.

"I think this is an advantage," he says. "I put everything into the present tense. It's like I'm announcing the game for the first time. To us, the game isn't in the past."

Flemming Cares

Flemming is a perfectionist. "With Bill you have to be prepared," says Elliott. "If he sees a name he's never seen before, he wants to know how to pronounce it. His standard line is 'Are you sure?' I'd hate to tell you how many times we've run to a phone at 6 a.m. to check out a pronunciation, a statistic, a record or even a home town."

Peacock rolls the cameras at 6 a.m., and Flemming begins reading. If he makes a mistake, the film is still rolled because the important item is to get all the film onto video-tape. After that is accomplished, then the backtracking is done. When Flemming is happy with the script and is sure that everything is correct, he proceeds in his one-shot fashion.

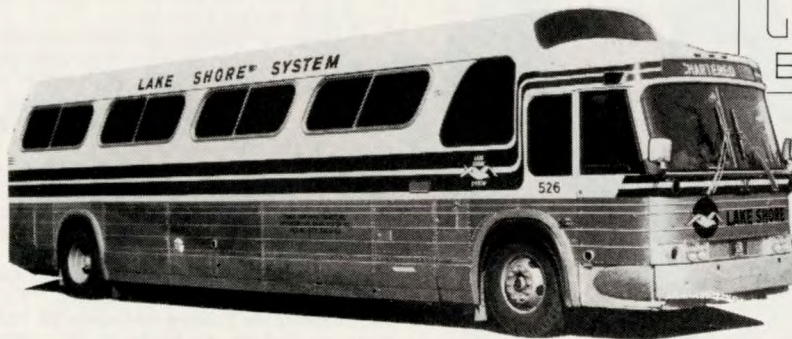
The result is an exciting football show, which provides information—an entertaining news show.

"The show is good," Flemming claims, "and I can tell you why. We have a great team, and we all 'dig' college football."

The 12-hour period which spawns the Sunday Morning College Football Highlights Show is summed up by Flemming: "Physically exhausting."

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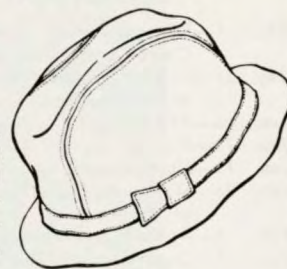
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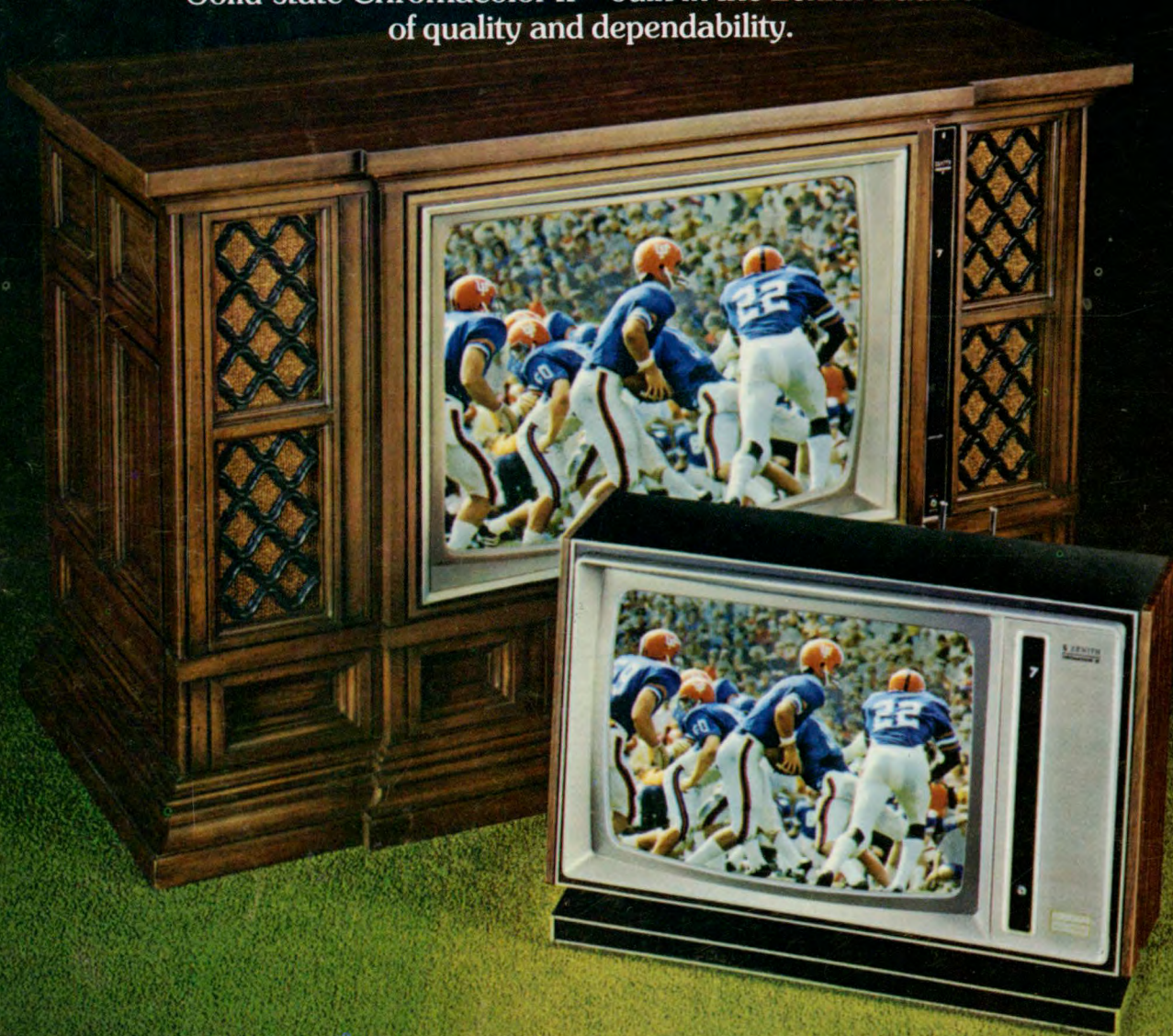
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
