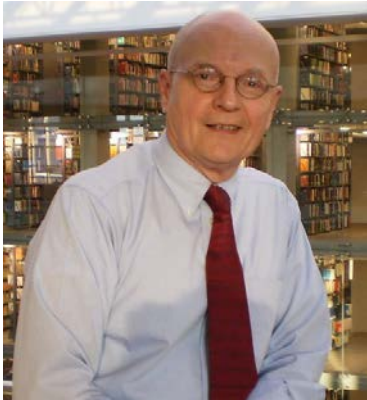

## ARL Observing Copyright Week

This week, the Electronic Frontier Foundation (EFF) is hosting "[Copyright Week](#)" with each day devoted to a different copyright-related issue. Copyright Week will last six days, ending on Saturday, January 18. January 18 is the two-year anniversary of the Internet blackouts protesting the Stop Online Piracy Act (SOPA) and the PROTECT IP Act (PIPA). ARL and several other organizations are participating in Copyright Week. Throughout the week, participants will discuss key principles that should guide copyright debates and policy. ARL will be contributing to Copyright Week with blogs on several issues. The first posting can be found on the [ARL Policy Notes blog](#).

Here are the topics and principles for each day of the week.

- ° Monday Jan 13 - Transparency: Copyright policy must be set through a participatory, democratic and transparent process. It should never be decided through back room deals or secret international agreements.
- ° Tuesday Jan 14 - Building and Defending a Robust Public Domain: The public domain is our cultural commons and a public trust. Copyright policy should seek to promote, and never diminish, this crucial resource.
- ° Wednesday Jan 15 - Open Access: The results of publicly funded research should be made freely available to the public online, to be fully used by anyone, anywhere, anytime.
- ° Thursday Jan 16 - You Bought it, You Own It: Copyright policy should foster the freedom to truly own your stuff: to tinker with it, repair it, reuse it, recycle it, read or watch or launch it on any device, lend it, and then give it away (or re-sell it) when you're done.
- ° Friday Jan 17 - Fair Use Rights: For copyright to achieve its purpose of encouraging creativity and innovation, it must preserve and promote ample breathing space for unexpected and innovative uses.
- ° Saturday Jan 18 - Getting Copyright Right: A free and open Internet is essential infrastructure, fostering speech, activism, new creativity and new business models for artists, authors, musicians and other creators. It must not be sacrificed in the name of copyright enforcement.

## Special Collections Travel Grants Announced

Building on the success of the last two years, Pennsylvania State University Special Collections announces four travel awards of \$1,500 this year for researchers whose work would benefit from access to the collections held at Penn State.

The 2014 travel grants include:

- One award for research using any of the Special Collections Library collections;
- Two awards for research related to women writers;
- One award for research pertaining to history of the Eighth Air Force during World War II.

Awards will be selected based on the quality of proposed research and its relevance to Special Collections holdings.

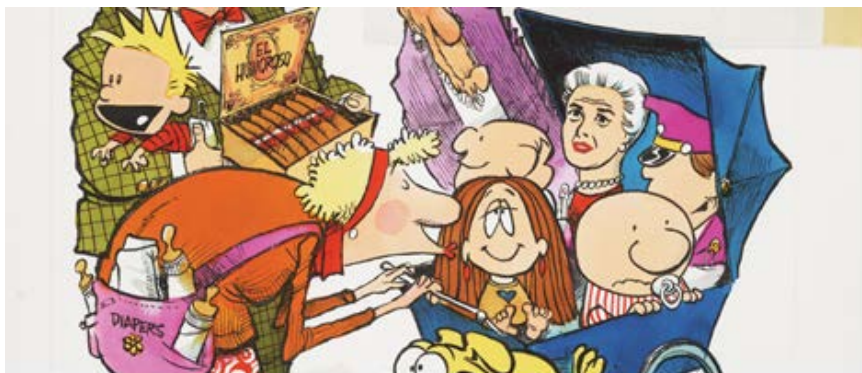

A cartoon is a unique combination of words and pictures that can tell a story,



state an opinion or make people laugh. “Substance and Shadow,” John Leech’s famous *Cartoon No. 1* published in *Punch* magazine on July 15, 1843, is widely considered to be the first modern use of the term. Cartoonists have mastered an almost limitless vocabulary of graphic expression to entertain and enlighten their audiences but the creative process is still a mystery to most readers. This exhibition explores the unsung heroes of theatre—the innovators, designers, and technicians—whose “magic” has wowed audiences since the beginnings of show business. Visitors will uncover the secrets behind special effects, explore the workings of a toy theatre and a 17th-century theatre through virtual reality, experience what a magic lantern “pose show” might have looked like, and try their hand at theatrical lighting design. The exhibition will feature manuscripts, photographs, original designs, set models, props, and costumes from the special collections of the Lawrence and Lee Theatre Research Institute.
