SEARCH COMMITTEE FOR ASSISTANT DEAN

The Search Committee is responsible for finding an assistant dean for OSUM.

The responsibilities of the assistant dean are: prepare a master schedule of classes for part-time and full-time students as well as schedule classrooms and laboratories, coordinate off-campus programs and offerings, develop credit courses on and off campus to attract the non-traditional student, manage an accurate student record system, coordinate the use of physical facilities with non-credit offerings and with MTC, and to administer a program of academic advisement.

The committee members consist of Chairman, Larry Yoder, Mary Kay Amann, Ralph Felger, Ruth Ann Gearhiser, Mark Green, O.P. Jones, John Millisor, and Linda Mulligan. An add for assistant dean at OSUM was advertised nationally in The Chronicle of Higher Education and the Affirmative Action Register. The deadline for applications was Jan. 5, 1979.

The committee started meeting on January 10 and since then have been meeting two days a week from three to four. The committee has made a list of twenty-two qualifications which are used to screen all of the applications. Approximately one hundred forty applications were received from all over the country. The committee must have at least names of three qualified people no later than February 8. If the three people that were chosen have not accepted jobs elsewhere, they will be invited to OSUM campus for an interview. A (seminar) will be set up so that faculty, administrative staff and students may screen the applicants themselves.

EXPANDED COURSE OFFERINGS

Beginning Autumn Quarter 1979 the Marion Campus of The Ohio State University will expand course offerings in the undergraduate program in business administration.

According to C. E. Maynard, Dean and Director of The Ohio State University Marion Campus, this expansion has been brought by the continuing desire of the University to meet the educational needs of the people in our seven county area. "The expansion will not only benefit our present students, but it will also facilitate work toward a degree in business administration and continued professional development for those persons employed by business and industry in the area," Maynard said.

With the addition of new courses added to those already offered at the Marion Campus, students may now fulfill all but approximately three quarters of work toward the bachelor's degree in business administration at the Marion Campus.

The expanded program relates specifically to eleven undergraduate majors in the College of Administrative Science.

Students in these degree programs could ultimately complete Bachelor of Science in Business Administration (BSBA) degrees at the Columbus Campus. 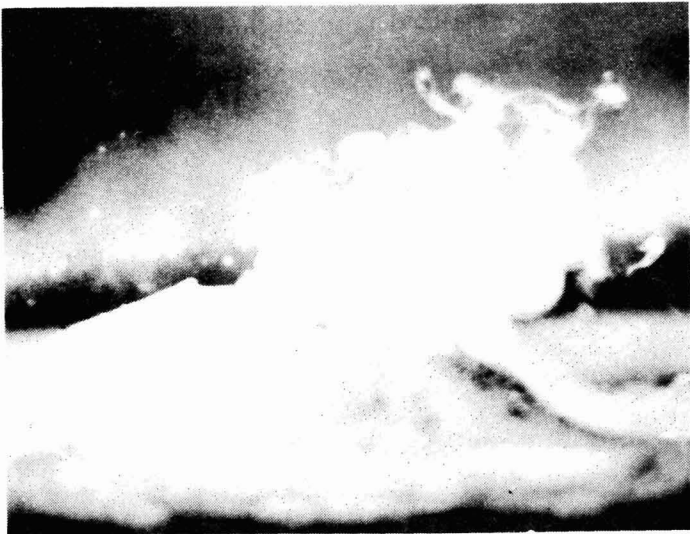
