WHO'S WHO AT LIMA CAMPUS

Dr. David Hagar received his B.S. and M.S. in Zoology from the University of Vermont and his Doctorate from the University of Massachusetts.

Dr. Hagar's major field of interest is in the study of Arid Area Geomorphology. He participated on a grant sponsored by the office of Aerospace Research held by the University of Massachusetts to study and map the Lower Mojave River Valley. Since earning his Doctorate Dr. Hagar returns summers to the Southwest and Mojave Desert in expanding his work on mapping the Pleistocene epoch. Dr. Hagar also did research on the Atlantic Coastal Plain which included states from Virginia to Southern Georgia. Carolina Bays or aligned elliptical depressions were the major source of study which was sponsored by the Navy.

Dr. Hagar taught as an Assistant Instructor of Geology at the University of Vermont for two years. He taught five years at the University of Maine as an Instructor of Geology. Dr. Hagar joined Ohio State at the Lima Campus in 1966.

Dr. Hagar and his wife Susan have four sons: J. Duncan, 17; Andrew, 13; Dan, 10; and Peter, 7. Mrs. Hagar teaches sixth grade at Perry Elementary. The Hagars reside at 2214 Wellesley Drive in Lima. They enjoy skiing, hiking, camping and photography.

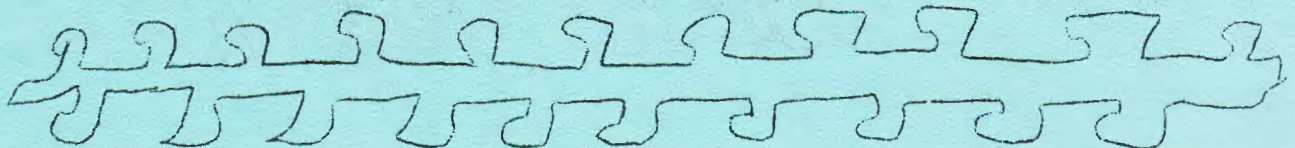
DESPERATELY NEEDED
