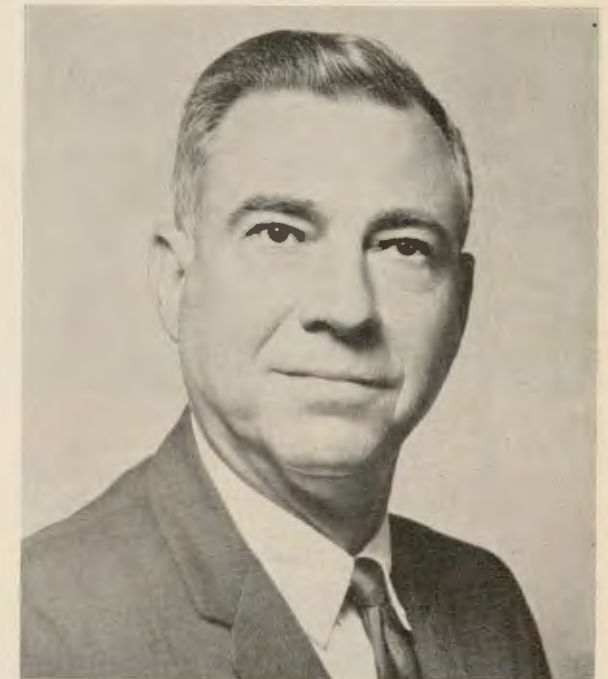

Texas Christian University

Texas Christian University, the oldest institution of higher learning in West Texas, is currently in its 94th year. Joining hands with Fort Worth in 1911 in what has proven to be a highly pleasant and profitable partnership, the University offers a rich heritage, a bright present, and a relatively unlimited future.

After fire destroyed the University's main building in Waco in 1910, TCU's trustees accepted an offer from Fort Worth which included a 50-acre site, assurance of connections with city utilities, a street car, and \$200,000.

Today's campus covers 244 acres and casts its educational shadow across all 50 states and approximately 30 foreign countries represented in its student body.

Last fall's record enrollment of 7,232 represented a 5.4 per cent increase over the fall of 1964. Admissions applications for 1966-67 point to new highs in enrollment. Undergraduate day schools and colleges were responsible for the 1965-66 increase with a rise of 12.1 per cent in one year.

The number of earned degrees conferred in 1966 was over 1000 for the second consecutive year. In a record-setting spring commencement, 754 received degrees. In August, bachelor, master, and doctoral degrees were awarded to more than 300 students. The University now has more than 19,300 graduates.

With the opening of the 1965-66 academic year came the opening of a sixth area of doctoral work—history. Advanced degree work, which began in 1960, also includes physics, psychology, mathematics, English and chemistry. The first doctor's degree in chemistry was conferred during the August, 1966, commencement, which brought the total of earned Ph.D. degrees to 31. The offering of the doctor's degree in 10 to 12 additional areas is included in TCU's future plans.

TCU offers 21 degrees in approximately 80 fields. The teaching force numbers approximately 500 and 60 per cent of the full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees. Twelve degrees are offered on the graduate level, including masters of arts, science, business administration, professional accounting, music, music education, fine arts, education, religious education, theology, Doctor of Philosophy and Bachelor of Divinity.

Chartered in 1962 by the State of Texas, TCU's Research Foundation is following a four-point plan adopted a year ago. This program provides:

1—research grants for faculty scientists.

- 2—help in providing buildings and capital facilities needed for graduate research.
- 3—a newly organized research unit within the University made up of research scientists and professors of national prominence. The unit includes special laboratories for use by all departments.
- 4—a research service to serve as a clearing house to match the research needs of business and industry to the research capabilities of the University.

A new structure to be built soon, and the remodeled Winton-Scott Hall will provide one of the most up-to-date university research centers in the country. Architects are Paul Rudolph of New York, and Preston M. Geren of Fort Worth. Total cost of the project, including the new building, remodeling and equipment for the entire center, is estimated at \$6.5 million.

Graduate study awards in the form of fellowships and graduate assistantships for the 1966-67 year represent the largest number ever given by TCU. Last year 263 students received \$433,266 in financial aid with funds made available by the University and such sources as National Aeronautics and Space Agency, National Defense Education Act, National Science Foundation, and research grants. This year's recipients represent 28 states and four foreign countries and hold bachelor's degrees from 25 Texas colleges, 54 out-of-state institutions, and four foreign universities.

Dr. James M. Moudy, the first alumnus and native-born Texan to hold the University's highest post, began his second year as chancellor in July.

A Future Planning Commission, approved by the TCU Board of Trustees at its spring meeting, begins its work this September. The Commission has the responsibility for making recommendations for action that will produce constant improvement in the operation of the University. It is to be continually alert to changes in the needs and obligations facing the University.

The University will celebrate its 100th anniversary during the 1972-73 year. "Centennial Goals" include approximately 12 new buildings, a greatly increased salary scale for faculty and staff, \$2,000,000 more annually to upgrade graduate programs, and at least \$1,650,000 more annually to support the Ph.D. goals. The completion of a health center and five new dormitories are goals which have become realities. Enrollment for the centennial year is projected at approximately 12,000 per semester.

The College of Law

Founded in 1885, the Ohio State University College of Law began operations in 1891 with an enrollment of 33 students, which grew to 63 by the end of the year.

Today, the college enrolls more than 500 students and graduates more than 100 each year.

On campus, the college was successively housed in Hayes Hall and in Orton Hall, and from 1903 to 1958 it occupied Page Hall, named in honor of Henry F. Page, a lawyer and benefactor of the college.

In 1959 the college moved into its present building, which provides the most modern study, research and class facilities for all law students.

It contains a 220,000-volume law library, largest in Ohio and seventh in the nation. The library has strong collections in British Commonwealth and American court reports, legislation, digests, periodicals, treaties and annotations. Its holdings of federal administrative decisions and state session laws and statutes are among the most complete in the nation.

First dean of the college was the Hon. Marshall J. Williams, justice of the Supreme Court of Ohio. The present dean is Prof. Ivan C. Rutledge.

Instruction during the first 15 years was by leading Columbus lawyers who taught on a part time basis. In 1909 the college gained its first full time faculty of five teachers. A half century later, the full time faculty increased four fold, assisted by a complement of adjunct professors.

A Legal Aid Clinic is administered by the college to give legal assistance to indigent clients and to provide every law student with clinical experience.

Services of the clinic, located in the Law College Building, are also available to faculty, staff and students for advice and consultation on legal matters without charge.

The clinic cooperates closely with the Legal Aid and Defender Society and the Columbus Bar Association.

It trains men and women for careers in private practice, business, government, on the bench, and in teaching, and offers the bachelor of laws degree (LL.B.) and juris doctor degree (J.D.).

The new law school held classes for the first several years in the Franklin County Courthouse, before moving to the campus in 1894. In 1896 the name of the law school was changed to its present name, The College of Law, The Ohio State University.

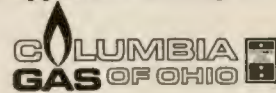

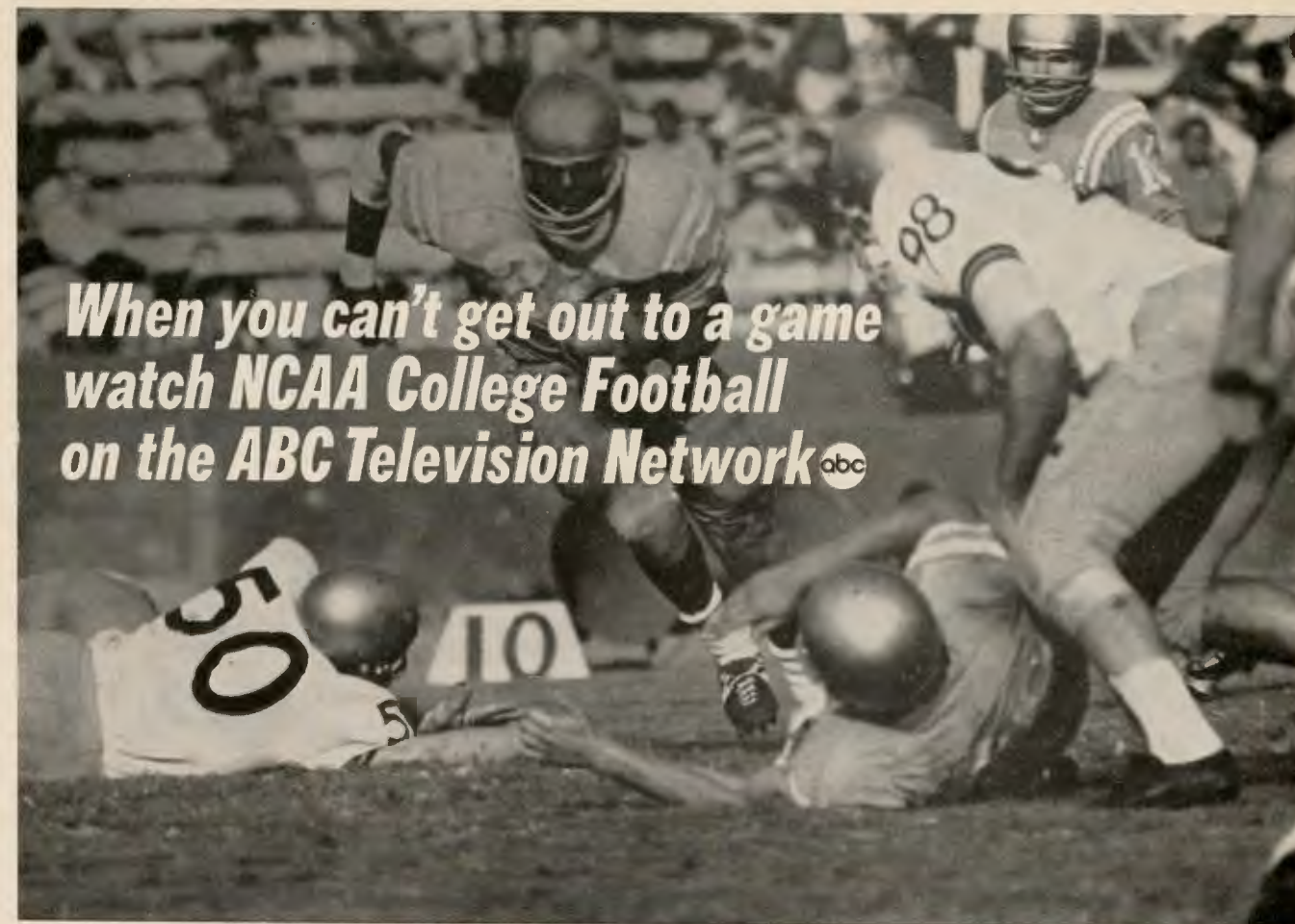

TICKET SALES

AVAILABLE TICKETS are for sale at gate 1 (closed end). The Ticket Office is located in the southeast corner of the St. John Arena, just 100 yards north of the closed end of the Stadium. Phone CY 3-2624.

Permanent seats: 71,371. Total Seating capacity, 81,109. Construction cost: \$1,341,000. Financed chiefly by gifts aggregating \$1,083,000, pledged by 13,000 persons. Seats in Section A: 31,330; Section B, 14,429; Section C, 21,145. "A" Boxes, 2,828; "B" Boxes, 1,748. Total permanent seats, 71,480.

Temporary seats: South stands, 4,858; field seats, 4,771. Total temporary seats, 9,629.

Total seats between goal lines: 29,175 or 37%. Height of wall: 98 feet, three inches; length, 752 feet, 6 inches, ground area, 10 acres. Circumference, one third mile. Material: Concrete and steel. Seats in press box, 144. Radio and photo booths, 18.

SCOREBOARDS

The Stadium has three scoreboards. Two are located at the southeast and southwest towers. The third is located at the north end under "C" deck.

ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES

Eighty-seven concrete and steel arches each 13 feet wide and 56 feet high. Towers at the open and north entrance each 100 feet high and 36 feet square. A half dome 86 feet, six inches high and 70 feet in diameter. Twelve ramps feed 112 aisles.

GAME TIME

All games will begin at 1:30 p.m. EST.

VARSITY "O"

Post-game meeting place of Varsity "O" will be in the recreation center of the stadium dormitories.

SERVICE TO PATRONS

Emergency medical treatment is available in special first aid quarters back of Sections 11 and 12 in "B" deck. A mobile section also is available on the ground level at the northeast section of the Stadium. Pay telephones are located at Sections 5A, 8A, 10A, 17A, 19A, 20A, 22A, and at the southeast corner of the Stadium.

A LOST and FOUND WINDOW is maintained at the north or closed end of the Stadium until 30 minutes after the games. Losses should be reported there and any articles found should be turned in there or to any usher. Address inquiries to Arena Ticket Office, St. John Arena (CY 3-2624).

RADIO AND MOVIE CAMERAS

Western Conference rules prohibit spectators having either RADIOS or MOVIE CAMERAS at the games. These may be checked at the LOST and FOUND WINDOW at the north or closed end of the Stadium and may be reclaimed there until 30 minutes after game at the same window.

PUBLIC ADDRESS ANNOUNCEMENTS

No announcements are ever made over the Stadium public address system except under the gravest circumstances, such as serious illness or accident. Kindly refrain from requesting this service.

Physician members of the Academy of Medicine of Columbus and Franklin County and the staff of Doctor's Hospital are paged by numbers.

REST ROOMS

Men's rest rooms are located at gates 7, 10, 12, 13, 17, 18, 23 and 24. Women's rest rooms are located at gates 1, 2, 12, 13, 19 and 20. Four rest rooms also are located on "B" deck. The larger but least used rest rooms are located on B level at the north or closed end of the Stadium.
