## RESULTS OF BLANKET ADVERTISING CAMPAIGN ANNOUNCED

For the convenience of many merchants and the three student publications, a blanket advertising program was established. Merchants from Columbus, Newark, Heath, and surrounding areas were solicited. The **STUDENT DIRECTORY**, **OUTLOOK**, and **ORACLE** will share the profits which at the present time amount to \$1688.

With the assistance of Mr. Armstrong and Mr. McCaughy, the project was guided by Steve Schorger, Circle K; who was aided by Robin Queen, **OUTLOOK**; and Nancy Gregg, **ORACLE**. Judia Picklesimer, assistant editor of the year book and typist for the **ORACLE**, sold the most advertising with a total of \$355. Scotty Harp ran a close second collecting \$342.

### STUDENTS TO JUDGE TEACHERS

The Student Senate Award For Teaching Excellence will be given to a worthy teacher at a banquet during the spring quarter. The winning instructor will receive a cash prize of \$100 and will have his or her name engraved on a plaque to be placed at the entrance to the new Newark Campus building.

The award was conceived when an anonymous donation of \$100 was received last year, with the stipulation that it be awarded to a deserving teacher. This will be the first year, however, that a teacher will have actually received the award.

The honoree will be selected by a survey among the students each of the three quarters. The votes will be processed through The Computer Center in Columbus. This will enable any discrepancy caused between a teacher who may teach only one quarter and one who has several classes every quarter to be eliminated. At the end of the year the teachers with the most favorable scores will be interviewed by a committee of Student Senate members. These members are Nancy Wolford, chairman, Robin Queen, Mary Ann Tiburzio, and Walter Weber. This committee will also be conducting a survey in every class of each teacher nominated.

## Campus Students Have Opportunity To Attend Away Games

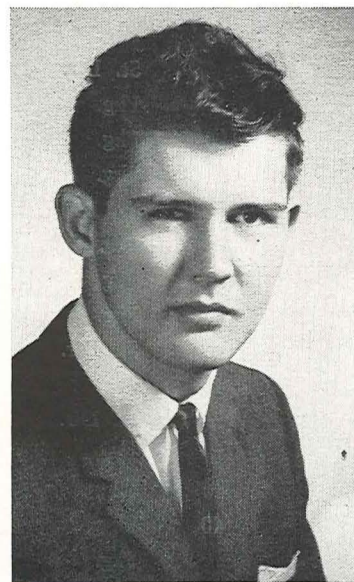
