This concise textbook on biochemistry is not offered as a substitute for, nor is it a condensation of, the author's well known textbook of Physiological Chemistry. It is written for the medical student who must cover the subject in a limited time and yet not miss any of the fundamentals. The text is based on the author's long teaching experience. It progresses logically and easily and gives a digest of established facts without going into speculative fields. The many structural formulae are clearly printed and some of the chapters dealing with broadly complex material are followed by summaries. Newer subject matter is given as from the particular worker in that field, but there is no compilation of a reference bibliography. The book has a good working index.—R. G. SCHOTT.
