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## LANGUAGE STUDY OPPORTUNITIES

241 Indiana University will hold its annual Slavic Workshop from 21 June - 16 August 1974. Instruction will be offered in Russian, beginning, intermediate and advanced levels, Polish and Serbocroatian. It is possible that a course in Bulgarian will also be available.

Courses in the Workshop are highly intensive, running 4-5 hours per day for the course period, and give eight to ten semester hours of credit. Tuition is \$29 per credit hour for all students. Professor Lucy Jen Huang (Ph.D. Chicago) was originally from Shanghai, China. Her major works are in the area of the changing family in the People's Republic of China published by The China Quarterly, Asian Survey, Journal of Marriage and the Family and several other journals. She is currently doing research on the Chinese-American family and cohabiting couples among unmarried students. She has been teaching a new course entitled Alternate Models in Marriage and the Family.

Professor Norton T. Dodge (Ph.D. Harvard) also has an M.A. in Soviet Area Studies from Harvard University. His book, Women in the Soviet Economy: Their Role in The Economic, Scientific, and Technical Development was published by John Hopkins University Press in 1966. Since then Professor Dodge has been exploring the role of women in agriculture, and in Soviet Society as a whole, including the impact of the revolution and industrialization on the Soviet family.

Professor Laurel Richardson Walum's major fields of research and publication include the Sociology of Gender, Sociological Theory, and The Sociology of Science. She is also concerned with the ritual language of everyday life.

## LANGUAGE STUDY OPPORTUNITIES ABROAD

### SUNY PROGRAMS IN POLAND

243. The State University of New York at Stony Brook announces two programs of study in Poland beginning with summer 1974.

#### Summer Program

This is intended to provide 25 American students with the chance to study Polish language and culture and gain a first-hand knowledge of contemporary Poland.

Dates: June 15 - August 15, 1974

Place: University of Poznan

Qualifications: Students must have completed at least one year of post-high school study and two semesters (or equivalent) of Polish. All participants must be US citizens.

Cost: SUNY tuition	\$175.
Program fee	450.
Incidentals	75.

#### Academic Year Program

This program is intended to provide 10 American undergraduate and graduate students with the opportunity to study at the University of Poznan for a full academic year. (All students who wish to take part in this program must also participate in the Summer program.) To qualify, a student must have advanced undergraduate or graduate standing at the time of application. The same language requirements as those of the summer program apply.

244 Victor Rashkovsky, former staff member, Mosfilm Studios, Moscow, will speak on "Modern Soviet Cinematography" at 1 PM 24 January 1974 in Recital Hall, College Conservatory of Music, Clifton Avenue, University of Cincinnati. The public is invited.

Mr. Rashkovsky studied at the Institute of the Art of the Theatre in Moscow from 1963-70 where he received the MA degree equivalent. From 1961-1969 he was Assistant Sound Director at Mosfilm Studios; he also served as a member of the editorial board of the Art Cinema Journal. From December, 1970 to May, 1972 he was a Research Associate in the Division of Theoretical Problems of the Sociology of Art, Institute of Sociological Research of Soviet Academy of Sciences.
