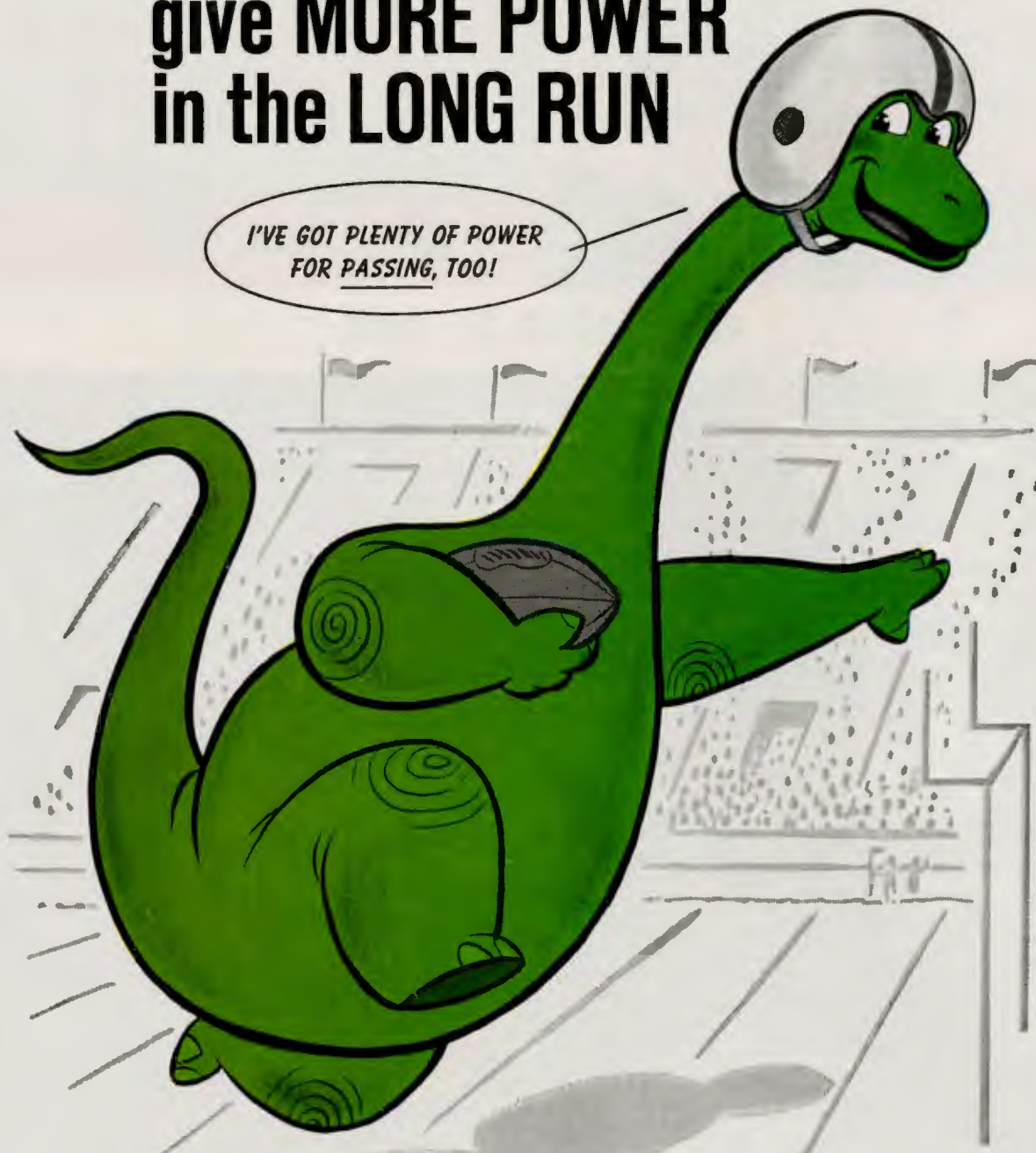

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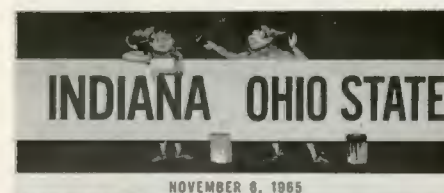

Indiana University

INDIANA UNIVERSITY, by virtue of the provisions of the Indiana State Constitution of 1816 and 1851 and acts of the General Assembly of Indiana, is the University of the state and head of the Hoosier school system.

Founded in 1820 — one year after Thomas Jefferson established the University of Virginia — Indiana is among the oldest of the large state universities west of the Alleghenies.

Its main campus, now as when founded, is in Bloomington in southern Indiana. This campus, including land for future develop-

ment, covers 1,850 acres, is gently rolling and wooded, and is held to rank high in beauty among the college campuses of the country.

The real campus of the University, however, is the state of Indiana to all parts of which the institution has extended its instructional and other services. The Medical Center campus of 85 acres, with its Schools of Medicine, Dentistry, and Nursing, and related health sciences divisions, is in Indianapolis. Other divisions, including an evening division of the School of Law, Graduate Division of Social Service, and Normal College of the American Gymnastics Union, also are in Indianapolis. In nine cities of the state, including Indianapolis, the University maintains campuses and centers. One is operated jointly with Earlham College and one with Vincennes University. Through the campuses and centers a student may accumulate up to 60 hours of undergraduate work applicable to a degree at Indiana or any other university. Certificates for the completion of certain specified series of courses may also be earned in a number of fields.

In its 144-year history the University has developed from an institution with an enrollment of ten students and a faculty of one professor to one with more than 36,000 full- and part-time credit students taught by some 1,700 full-time faculty members and about 1,800 part-time instructors.

From its beginning when only Greek and Latin were offered as courses of study, the institution — first a seminary, then a college, and since 1838 a university — has grown to include 16 colleges, schools, and major divisions. These are: Junior (Freshman) Division; College of Arts and Sciences; Schools of Medicine, including the School of Nursing and Division of Allied Health Sciences; Education, Law, Dentistry, Business, Music, and Health-Physical Education-Recreation; Graduate School; and Divisions of University Extension, Social Service, Library Science, Optometry and Biological Sciences. The University grants 77 different undergraduate, graduate, and honorary degrees.

The University has more than 140,000 living graduates and former students. The alumni have included Ernie Pyle, Wendell L. Willkie, Hoagy Carmichael, and many others who have achieved prominence in government, business, law, medicine, education, and other professions and fields of work. Alumni who head, or have headed, institutions of higher learning number 112, giving the University the name of "Mother of College Presidents."

Dr. Elvis J. Stahr, 12th president of Indiana University who took office July 1, 1962, is an educator, lawyer and public administrator. He has practiced law in New York City, served as dean of the law school and Provost of the University of Kentucky, vice-chancellor of the University of Pittsburgh, president of West Virginia University and, from January 1961 until resigning to become president of Indiana University, was Secretary of the Army.

Dr. Herman B. Wells, whom Dr. Stahr succeeded, served as Indiana's president for 25 years and is presently Chancellor of the University and president of the Indiana University Foundation.



Indiana University's official seal has remained unchanged in major details since its adoption by the Board of Trustees on July 17, 1841.

The Great Provider

Bud Wilkinson coached Oklahoma to three national football championships in his 17 years at the University. His teams of 1954-55-56-57 won 47 consecutive games. He served as special Consultant on Youth Fitness to the late President Kennedy. His background as Kennedy's aide and as the nation's winningest football coach well qualifies him for his position as president of Lifetime Sports Foundation.



FOOTBALL is a demanding game.

It demands that each player give the absolute maximum of his talent and resources of his mind and heart. The game is the supreme physical test of a man's strength, speed, reactions and endurance. It relentlessly measures his qualities of character, self-discipline, courage and will to win.

Football is a game of emotion for fans as well as players. Every spectator is caught in the excitement and tension. As a rallying point for fans and as a taskmaster that ingrains lasting lessons in those who play, football has proved worthy of the attention it receives. It has earned its place in the hearts of all Americans who value rugged competition.

But in the world of intercollegiate athletics, football, thanks to people like yourself, plays another important role. It is the Great Provider.

Football can, and often does, create the surplus money that provides athletic facilities for the entire student body. Golf courses, swimming pools, bowling lanes, tennis courts, and innumerable other facilities have been built with football funds. Football receipts enable schools to compete in other collegiate sports and provide physical education and intramural programs.

Speaking strictly from the standpoint of its physical benefits, the game of football, (or any other varsity sport) affects only the gifted athletes who play the game. But indirectly, football gives to every student the opportunity to develop physical fitness and participate in sports competition.

Every student should develop the physical, mental and moral resources essential to a full, vigorous

life. Every student should learn the skills of sports he can play and enjoy throughout life. To make this opportunity a concrete realization should be the basic aim of the physical education, intramural and varsity program of each school, college and university.

Such a program is the responsibility of every school. What about the school your children attend? Does it include programs that will give them the opportunity to learn what the players on this field are learning? Do they too have the chance to develop the self-discipline and physical coordination necessary to remain healthy and active all their lives? I recommend that you look into their school situation and give the same attention to this problem that you give to your favorite football team. Your concern will be the determining factor in the physical well-being of your children, and will influence the vigor and quality of their intellectual and emotional lives.

The Lifetime Sports Foundation, with which I am associated, is one of the organizations dedicated to the achievement of this educational goal. We seek to help each child attain an adequate level of fitness, and to learn sports skills that can be enjoyed throughout life. If this cooperative goal can be realized it will give all of us who love football added reason to cherish those who play.

College of Arts and Sciences

THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES is the largest of Ohio State's colleges, enrolling quarterly during the 1964-65 academic year nearly 10,000 undergraduate students.

It also is one of the university's oldest colleges, dating back to 1896 when it was formed from a merger of the School of Exact Sciences and School of Letters and Philosophy, divisions of the Ohio Agricultural and Mechanical College, as Ohio State was then known.

At the time of its organization, the college was known as the College of Arts, Philosophy and Science. The present name was adopted in 1930.

During the 1964-65 academic year, the college awarded 1,062 bachelor of arts or bachelor of science degrees and 28 bachelor of science in

optometry degrees. For administrative purposes, the School of Optometry and School of Journalism are included in the college.

Headed by Dean J. Osborn Fuller, the college aims at developing thinking men and women capable of understanding themselves and the world around them, aware of the problems of their society, and qualified to help in solving these problems.

Curricula in the college are based on the concept that the important value of education lies not in what is learned but in learning to think, to sort out facts and to search for new ones, to examine them critically and to put them together in meaningful relationships.

Majors in the college range from anatomy and ancient history to speech and zoology, and include such pre-professional curricula as pre-dentistry, pre-law, pre-medicine, pre-nursing, pre-pharmacy, pre-theology and pre-veterinary medicine.

Included in the college is the department of geodetic science, a field which is concerned with the measurement of the earth and which has assumed vital importance to the nation's space and defense programs. Ohio State is the leading university in the Western Hemisphere in geodetic science and geodetic scientists at Ohio State have assembled the largest civilian collection of gravity data in the Western world.

In other research, the college's chemistry department conducted research during 1963-64 amounting to \$905,902, second highest in volume among all university departments.

An American Characteristic

One of college football's best friends is FRED RUSSELL, sports editor of the *Nashville Banner*. His "Sidelines" column is well written and widely read.

COLLEGE football has been described as "the element of American life most characteristic of our nationality." Another season reinforces the validity of this distinction.

The game appeals to the emotions like no other form of athletic competition. Spectators at college games, setting new overall attendance records every year, revel in exercising the deep-rooted passions of joy, courage, sympathy, sorrow, rivalry, risk, sense of fairness and loyalty.

College football crowds aren't there just to admire the skill of some passer or the cleverness of a runner or the accuracy of a place-kicker or punter. They are there wanting to see their team win.

Thrilling touchdown plays are fine, like getting the end piece of the cake with the thick icing. But the overwhelming majority of college game-goers would rather see their team win, even if it's 2-0 in a dogged defensive struggle, than to witness a dozen exciting scoring plays during a game which their team loses.

Can you think of a more hollow attraction than an exhibition contest between two college football squads?

The feel of the crowd is a standard fixture at college games. From September through November there are just ten such occasions, full of color and flavor, for the release of our competitive impulses. And so often in college football the anticipation is exceeded by the realization.

Most of the college players on the field are whamming and slamming for the sheer joy of proving themselves to themselves. Ernest Thompson Seton once said: "Manhood is the first law of education." Of course football is just one of many opportunities available in the quest for manhood, but the competitive flame in the clash of spirited, cohesive forces is the rouser that attracts throngs to America's college stadiums.

Imperfection itself, among young athletes of 18 to 22, is part of college football's crowd appeal. Nothing in sports can be duller than perfection. The human experience of errors in action provides one of the world's liveliest shows. Somehow, the happiness reaped by players in the arena who withstand and overcome these mistakes often spills over into the crowd.

Many spectators are embraced by the camaraderie of college football. It can be felt by anybody. It was responsible for the following bit of nonsense:

A jovial fellow sitting 'way up in Row 65 got to his feet time and again and yelled, "Hey! Gus! Look here, Gus!"

Whereupon, down in Row 20 a man would rise, look up and wave. This friendly exchange went on interminably, until finally the man down in Row 20 shouted back to the greeter and advised him to stay in his seat and look at the game. "And besides," he finished, "my name's not Gus."

In the college football atmosphere are preserved some of the delights that go with life. "We have plenty of grim things facing us," said President Harlan Hatcher of University of Michigan. "We need the relief we find in sports. It's not only necessary to survive, but to live with some positive sense of joy and fulfillment."

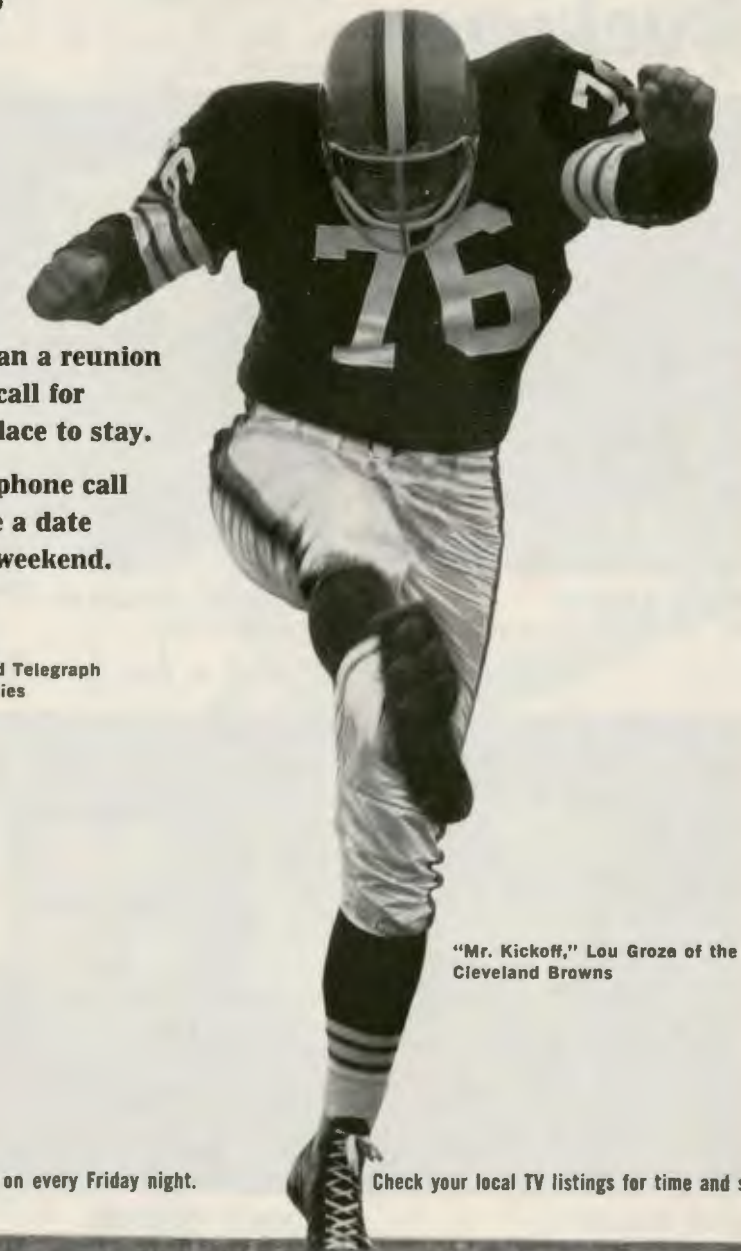

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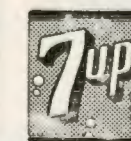

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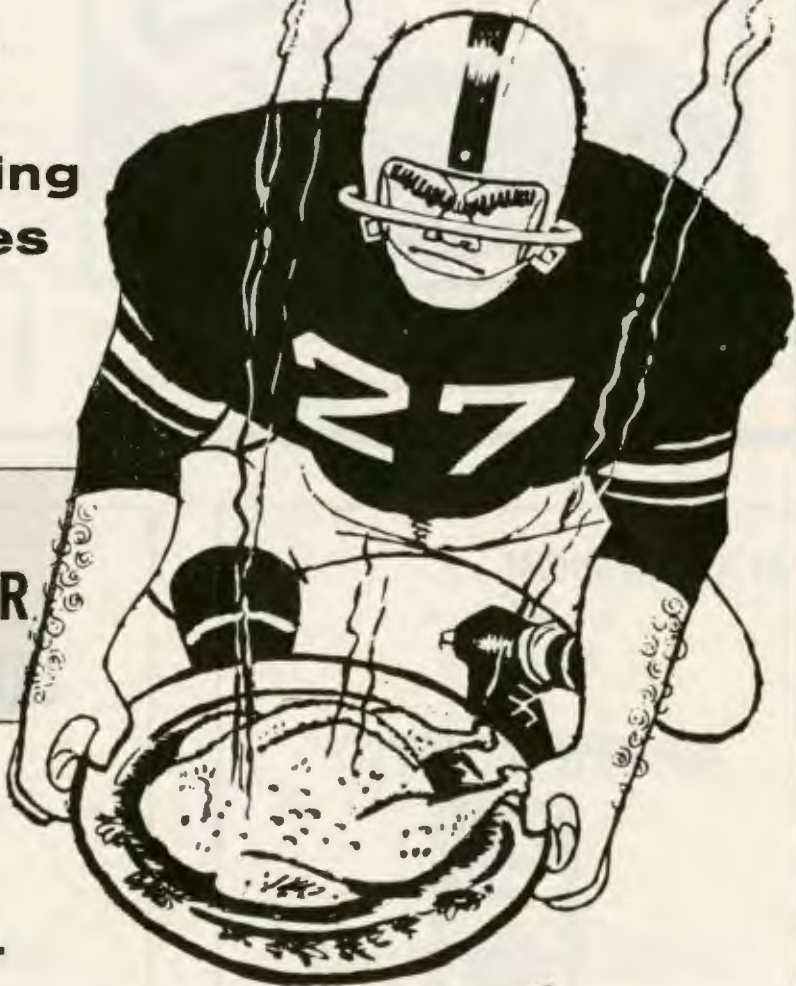
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
