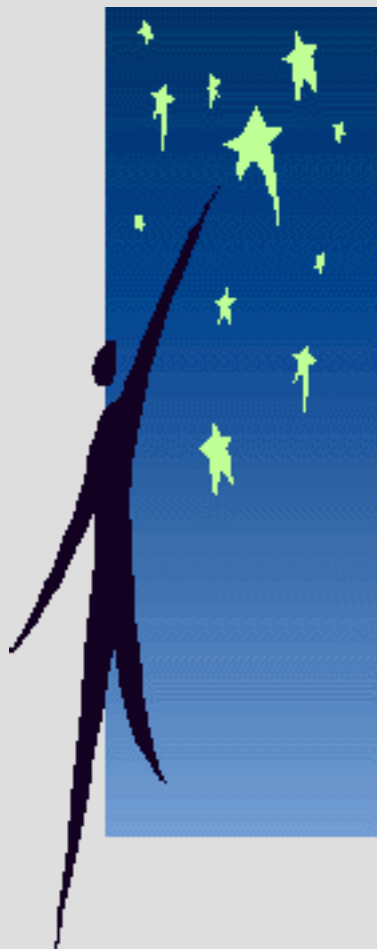
June SOS Gathering

Find messages in Eudora

One contributing factor to sluggish behavior in Eudora is an in-box that is too full. If messages are to be kept, it is recommended that mail be moved from the in-box to other mailboxes for storage. Afraid you won't find it again? Eudora has a sophisticated find feature that will help you to retrieve those messages when you need them.

To search in an open mailbox:

- Select *Edit/Find/Find text*
- Enter text to be found; both the header fields and the body of the message will be searched
- Click on "Find Next" button
- Eudora will highlight the first matching message, and each subsequent one each time you click on "Find Next"

Not sure which mailbox? To search more than one mailbox at a time:

- Select *Edit/Find/Find messages* OR use the magnifying glass icon on the toolbar
- Select search criteria
- Use "More" button to add additional criteria
- Place a checkmark next to the mailboxes to be searched
- Click on "Search" button
- Double-click on the desired message in the *Search Results* list to open the message

It's also a good idea to change the subject field of a message before moving it if the subject doesn't adequately reflect its content, or if the topic you are interested in is different from the

subject that concerned the sender. With the message open, simply over-write the text in the open space next to the word "Subject:" just below your toolbar.

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**OSU Libraries Participate in Ohio Memory Project
Digital Versions of Historical Documents and Artifacts Available on Internet**

Historical collections from the Ohio State University Libraries have been added to the Ohio Memory Online Scrapbook, available at <http://www.ohiomemory.org>. The Ohio Memory Project, which is administered by the Ohio Historical Society, was begun in June 2000. A second phase of the project was launched in October 2002.

The online scrapbook brings together primary source materials from more than 320 archives, historical societies, libraries, and museums around the state. Included are letters, diaries, government records, artwork, clothing, furniture, natural history specimens, and prehistoric artifacts. The scrapbook provides convenient access to historical collections that document state and local history. It contains more than 2,200 collections, which total more than 19,000 images.

Items submitted by our Music/Dance Library include slavery, Civil War, immigrant, abolition and temperance movement songs, as well as, a photo of Gray's Armory in Cleveland where the first concert of the Cleveland Orchestra took place and articles/photos of demonstrations of the first Thomas Edison phonograph. Of significant note is a 1918 publication of Mary Earl's "Beautiful Ohio," which became the official State Song of Ohio in 1969. Other contributions include materials from the Cartoon Research Library, the Lawrence and Lee Theatre Research Institute, Rare Books, University Archives and Special Collections, the Orton Geological Museum and the John Glenn Archives.

The Ohio Memory Project is a cooperative effort supported by the Institute for Museum and Library Services, the State Library of Ohio, the Ohio Bicentennial Commission, OhioLINK (the library consortium for higher education), the Ohio Public Library Information Network, INFOhio (the library network for K-12 schools), the Ohio Library Council, and the Ohio Historical Records Advisory Board.

"Ohio Memory is a valuable resource for students and teachers as well as the general public," Ohio Memory Project Manager Angela O'Neal says. "It is the only place on the Web where users can view collections from more than 300 Ohio cultural institutions."

Historian Andrew Cayton, author of the new book *Ohio: The History of a People*, says, "This project is a terrific example of the enduring legacy of the Ohio bicentennial celebration. Thousands of citizens will be using this virtual scrapbook of the state's history long after the birthday revelries have themselves become parts of Ohio's past."

**Online Information Resources in Ohio Grow Thanks to Federal Grant
Every Student, Educator, Researcher, and Public Library Patron Can Logon**

COLUMBUS (June 4, 2003) — From the moment they register for kindergarten, until life's last library card expires, Ohioans have access to a vast collection of electronic resources. The Statewide Core Electronic Information Collection (SCEIC) provides the necessary resources to support quality education, a skilled workforce, business growth, and lifelong learning in Ohio. A Library Services Technology Act (LSTA) grant was recently awarded by the State Library Board to help fund the addition of more resources to this core collection.

The current collection of 22 databases from EBSCO Publishing will be enriched by the addition of comprehensive online reference resources, an image library, a newspaper collection, and 13 literature databases. The new resources will be available to all Ohioans beginning in July 2003.

"The SCEIC is filling a critical need by providing resources that were formerly beyond the reach of Ohio's primary and secondary schools," Theresa M. Fredericka, executive director of INFOhio, said. "These resources provide the content and the tools that teachers, librarians and parents need to help our children succeed in the classroom and in life."

At the heart of the new additions to the SCEIC is the Britannica Online set of encyclopedias and the Oxford Reference Online collection. These two collections contain a wealth of electronic reference resources including comprehensive and abridged encyclopedias, dictionaries, thesauri, and the Enciclopedia Universal en Español.

The AMICO Library, a growing digital collection of more than 100,000 works of art from museums around the world, and the NewsBank collection of newspapers will also be available statewide. NewsBank provides full-text access to 17 Ohio and 13 non-Ohio newspapers, including major dailies like the Cleveland Plain Dealer, the Washington Post, and the Chicago Tribune.

Thirteen literature databases from Chadwyck-Healy/Proquest, that were previously unavailable to Ohio's K-12 schools, will also be added to the SCEIC. These databases include more than 6,000 works of drama and fiction, 324,000 poems by American and English authors, twenty-one versions of the Bible in English, and selected texts by Shakespeare.

To pay for the additions to Ohio's SCEIC, the LSTA grant will provide approximately \$1 million in funding per year for five years. Libraries Connect Ohio (LCO) will provide an additional \$380,000 per year in combined state funds.

If every school, college, university, and public library were to purchase these electronic resources individually, the cost would be in the multi-millions of dollars. With ever-tightening local budgets, few libraries can afford these resources on their own, let alone the space to store them. Electronic access is also much more convenient, faster, and cheaper than traditional interlibrary sharing of physical materials.

The Library Services and Technology Act is administered by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), a federal agency that fosters innovation, leadership and a lifetime of learning through the support of museum and library programs. Under LSTA, funding occurs through one of two broad based purposes: 1) technological innovation and electronic linkages, and 2) services to the underserved. In Ohio, LSTA funds are administered through the State Library of Ohio.

The SCEIC is a priority of Libraries Connect Ohio. LCO is a collaborative effort between Ohio's three statewide library programs and the State Library of Ohio. The three library programs are INFOhio, the state's virtual library and information network for K-12 libraries; the Ohio Library and Information Network (OhioLINK), the program for college and university libraries; and the Ohio Public Library Information Network (OPLIN), which provides all 250 of Ohio's public library systems with high-speed Internet access.

A robust SCEIC ensures that:

- Every school, public, and academic library throughout the state – regardless of size, location or fiscal resources – has equal access to available online materials;
- Ohio students have a consistent set of online resources to use, at home or at school, as they move through primary, secondary and higher education;
- Educators across the state have access to a broad range of online materials to support curricula.
