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Andy Rotter is Charles A. Dana Professor of History at Colgate College. He is a specialist in U.S. diplomatic history, recent U.S. history, and the Vietnam War. His research interests focus on U.S.-Asia relations, the Cold War, and history of the senses.

Rotter is the author of *Hiroshima: The World's Bomb* (Oxford University Press, 2008), *Comrades at Odds: Culture and Indo-U.S. Relations, 1947-1964* (Cornell University Press, 2000), and *The Path to Vietnam* (Cornell University Press, 1987). He is the editor of *Light at the End of the Tunnel: A Vietnam War Anthology* (Rowman and Littlefield, 2010) now in its third edition.

His numerous distinctions include President of the Society for Historians of American Foreign Relations, Gandhi Peace Foundation Fellowship, Harry S Truman Library Institute grant, and American Council of Learned Societies Senior Fellowship.

Before joining the faculty at Colgate, Rotter taught at St. Mary's College and Vanderbilt University. He received his M.A. and Ph.D. from Stanford University and his B.A. from Cornell University.



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
