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### **The Development of Scientific Thought**

This volume is the third edition of a successful treatment of the broad outlines of the development of scientific thought. The author holds that the study of such a history has much to teach both about the inner meaning of science itself and about its bearing on philosophy and religion. In this edition, not only has a new chapter been added covering the years 1930-1940, but extensive changes have been made in the original text. The older part includes chapters on the science of the ancient world, the middle ages, the renaissance, the Newtonian epoch, and the nineteenth century. The approach is scholarly, but eminently readable. A strong philosophical theme pervades the historical account. The scientist in any field can not fail to have a broader and deeper understanding of his chosen life-work after reading the book.
